TELEPHONES: The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of telephones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. Phone lines should be ordered through Pacific Bell at (818) 576-3204 for out-of-state institutions. In California, dial 811-3204 in your local area code.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day on Saturday and Sunday in Lot G northwest of the field, accessible from either State College or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of \$1.50 for a daily permit is required and is enforced.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

The main campus is located in Fullerton and a Mission Viejo campus was opened in August, 1989. The latter offers only upper-division and graduate courses.

The University's 25,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on the main campus in newly completed residence halls.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a growing list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletics training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theatre. All told, there are 86 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain onthe-job experience while continuing their regular studies. Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the main campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.


Further examples of community outreach are the new Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing with the October opening of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the City of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex in 1992. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.



NEW STADIUM -- This architects' model depicts the new baseball stadium that will be part of a \$10 million complex due to begin construction this summer. In addition to the 1,500 seat baseball facility, the project includes a football/soccer stadium, a running track and tennis courts as well as a second soccer field. The baseball stadium will be situated with home plate near what currently is the right-field foul pole.



CARRYING THE TITAN TRADITION INTO THE '90s

Administration

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981 and her tenure will conclude on July 31, 1990 upon her retirement.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for

seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 17 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School now serving on a post-residency fellowship at the New York University Medical Center.



Ed Carroll, Director of Athletics

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 39, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

One of Carroll's first moves was to upgrade the football schedule. The Titans have played LSU, Florida and West Virginia in recent seasons and have dates with Auburn and Georgia in the near future. With the new stadium complex now firmly on the horizon, Carroll has signed Mississippi State, Colorado State, UTEP and Army to home-and-home series.

Building plans are being finalized and construction has begun indirectly for an on-campus Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for baseball and football/soccer as well as an all-weather track. An oncampus Marriott Hotel opened in October and the revenue it generates will help finance the \$10.2 million athletics project.

Fund-raising levels have reached record numbers during Carroll's tenure. The Titan Athletic Foundation's 1989 spring drive raised more than \$450,000

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletics director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

Glorious Baseball History Had Modest Beginnings

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer would have foreseen a program that now features two national championships, five regional titles, 12 conference crowns and a baker's dozen of alumni in the major leagues.

It's been a memorable quarter century since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power, now under the hand of another successful coach in

veteran Larry Cochell.

Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing residence in the city and now houses the Titans' football coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the third-base line paralleled what is now called Gymnasium Drive, heading west. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a new field now situated farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their great tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA

championship.



The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans didn't miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief,to say the least. The Titans lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But experience would pay benefits down the road.

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league. The 7-team Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State L.A. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC

before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began in 1980 a frustrating streak of postseason play. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regionals at Tempe to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth and left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. A realignment of the infield seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see them win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA chamionship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of

Fresno State. An extra-inning title game played in 100+ degree heat finally went the Titans' way and presented a schedule of some of the nation's most famous institutions in the College World Series.

Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way. In a series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience that there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life in winning a 3-1 decision over the Longhorns in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel, who would set a CWS record for hits and win the Most Valuable Player Trophy, slid around the Michigan catcher to ignite a five-run eighth inning and give the Titans an opening 8-4 win over the Wolverines.

After a 6-4 loss to Texas sent them to the losers' bracket, the Titans fought back. They routed Miami, 13-5, with bunts and stolen bases rattling the Hurricanesinto four costly errors. They eliminated Arizona State as Reinholtz cooled the hot Devil bats and Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single. They outslugged Oklahoma State behind a Fishel home run, a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer got a rare starting call against the defending champions. A couple of infield hits in the first inning produced a run but that was to be all. Delzer pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door on Texas for his 22nd save.

The offensive hero was John Bryant, who stole a base to set up the tying run and then tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning that proved the difference.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league chamionship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an atlarge bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

By most school's standards, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoff berth as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home vs. UNLV on Apr. 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its first 13 games on its way to an 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runnerup UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA playoffs with a berth in the South II Regionals in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a confer-

ence that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, couldn't handle the Tigers. The pivotal play occurred when his glove came off while fielding a comebacker and the Titans could not rally, settling for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large NCAA bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a 3-run home run with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck couldn't repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titan team endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.


Thirteen products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into major league box scores with several more stars of recent Titan teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was lefthanded pitcher **Dan Boone**, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping Fullerton into the 1975 College World Series. He soon was followed by catcher **Dan Whitmer** at Toronto and California.

The biggest name came next as Tim Wallach, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos. He has played in several All-Star Games for the National League including the 1989 Classic in Anaheim.

More recent arrivals have been righthanded pitcher Jeff Robinson with the San Francisco Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates before a trade this past winter to the New York Yankees; outfielder Andre David, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder John Christensen with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners and the Twins.

Lefthanded pitcher Greg Mathews burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He started in the Championship Series for the Cardinals but has been bothered by arm problems the past two years.







Getting his debut in 1987 was Bill Moore with Montreal before the Titan Alumni Club exploded in 1988 with five players arriving for the "big show." The most heralded was pitcher Mike Harkey, who was starting at Wrigley Field for the Chicago Cubs 16 months after his last Titan appearance. He was selected USA Today's Minor League Player of the Year in 1988 but suffered a knee injury during spring training and missed the Cubs' 1989 divisional title team.

Earlier in the 1988 season, former Titan reliever Mike Schooler surfaced with the Mariners and he has become their top stopper and one of the best in baseball. In Philadelphia, Shane Turner was one of the players who tried to fill the shoes of Mike Schmidt at third base. In Houston, John Fishel, the MVP of the 1984 College World Series, was part of the Astros' futile run at the NL West flag before being traded to the Yankees. Kevin Reimer got a brief "cup of coffee" as a DH for the Texas Rangers.

HEAD COACH LARRY COCHELL



After only two years as head baseball coach at Cal State Fullerton, Larry Cochell has seen a peak and a valley and he expects the Titans to be back in the higher elevations in 1990 and to contend for a conference championship.

Cochell, 49, enters his 24th season as a head coach at the collegiate level, where he has earned national acclaim and respect as both a coach and administrator. Fullerton is the sixth head coaching stop for the Arizona State graduate, who is a past chairman of the American Baseball Coaches Association All-American Selection Committee.

In his first season at Fullerton in 1988, Cochell guided the Titans on their fifth trip to the College World Series, where they finished third after going unbeaten in the South Regional Tournament at Mississippi State. *Collegiate Baseball* selected him the national Coach of the Year as a personal reward for the 43-18 season.

In 1989, the Titans never recovered from the pre-season loss of All-American pitcher Mark Beck and staggered to their worst conference season since 1973, going 10-11 to finish in the second division. The overall record was a more respectable 30-27, but still the worst overall record since 1973.

Cochell takes a career record of 760-431-2 into the 1990 season. He notched win No. 700 on March 5, 1988, with a victory over Portland.

Cochell's 1988 trip to the NCAA playoffs was his tenth and it was his

second visit to the College World Series where his 1978 Oral Roberts squad finished fifth. He thus became only the third coach to take two different schools to Omaha. Cochell was also athletic director at Oral Roberts for four years (1983-86) before leaving to coach one season at Northwestern before moving to Fullerton.

The Lebanon, Oregon native is a product of the Bobby Winkles era at Arizona State (1964), and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Utah State. He was the head coach at Emporia State in Kansas for three years and at Creighton for two seasons before heading back west to Cal State L.A. in 1972, where he coached for five years.

Cochell has sent more than 60 players into professional baseball, including 24 in his five-year tenure at Cal State L.A. He has coached seven first-round draft picks including Fullerton catcher Brent Mayne (1989).

Cochell and his wife, Fran, have two sons, Craig (17) and Chad (13), and live in Placentia.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Fred Hoover is in his second season on the staff of Larry Cochell after retiring from one of the most respected junior college programs in California.

Hoover, 57, compiled a 435-269 record in 22 seasons at Golden West College in Huntington Beach. He had a string of 17 consecutive winning seasons and sent 64 players into professional baseball. His teams captured or shared seven conference championships and finished second seven times.

Hoover was a captain of both the football and baseball teams at Compton College and Pepperdine University, where he obtained his bachlor's degree in 1956. At Compton he was part of the 1952 national championship grid squad and at Pepperdine played baseball for John Scolinos, who currently is at Cal Poly Pomona and is the winningest active college coach in America. Hoover received a master's degree in 1960 from USC.

A baseball and football coach for 10 years at Lynwood High School and a professional scout for Cincinnati and Baltimore, Hoover moved to Golden West in 1967. He helped 123 Rustlers receive major-college scholarships and sent eight Rustlers into the major leagues while representing two different conferences in post-season play on a total of eight occasions. He also served as an assistant football coach and was athletics director in 1977-78.

Hoover and his wife Barbara Ann have three children and three grandchildren. He and Barbara Ann live in Fountain Valley.




Vern Ruhle, a righthanded pitcher with 13 years of major league experience, joins the Cal State Fullerton staff as pitching coach for Larry Cochell for the 1990 season.

Ruhle, 38, compiled a career record of 67-88 with the Detroit Tigers, Houston Astros, Cleveland Indians and California Angels. His best season was 1980 when he went 12-4 with a 2.38 earned run average and two shutouts for the National League West champion Astros.

Ruhle retired after the 1986 season, which he finished 1-3 in 16 games for the American League West champion Angels. He has been involved in real estate in the Long Beach area while also scouting for the Astros and coaching pitchers in their winter program.

Ruhle was a 17th-round draft choice of the Tigers in June, 1972. He gained the majors in 1974 and was the Tigers' Rookie of the Year in 1975. A sore arm led to his release in 1977 and he signed with the Astros. He missed most of the 1979 season due to back surgery but then rebounded in 1980 to fill the void caused by J.R. Richard's incapacitation and won 34 games through 1984 before going to Cleveland.

The Coleman, Michigan native resides in Long Beach with wife Darlene and children Rebecca and Kenneth.

Flores played his last collegiate season with the Titans in 1988 and helped lead the Titans to the South Regional champioinship and on to the College World Series in Omaha.

Flores started his college career at Golden West College under the tutelage of coach Fred Hoover, whom he will be working with at Fullerton. Flores was an All-South Coast Conference and All-Southern California selection for Golden West in 1984 when he hit .480 (60 for 125), which was a season high for the Rustlers.

He then transferred to Oklahoma in Norman, where he batted .289 as a junior for the Sooners before returning to Southern California. He sat out the 1987 season at Fullerton and then played his senior year for newcomer Cochell in 1988.

Flores hit .325 (78 for 240) at Fullerton with 4 home runs and 42 RBI. He was primarily a designated hitter for the Titans but also played third base.

He prepped at Marina High in Huntington Beach where he hit .499 his senior year and was named to the All-Sunset League and All-Orange County teams.

Shane is single and lives in Fullerton.



Dick Larner brings a broad business and baseball background to a full-time position with the Cal State Fullerton program for a fourth season.

Larner, 65, "retired" in 1985 after 33 years with Standard Oil of California. He served in a variety of management roles, most recently as marketing division manager of the southwest division.

Larner played baseball and basketball with great distinction at the University of California after serving in the South Pacific forthe U.S. Marine Corps during World War II. He was a member of Cal's 1947 national championship baseball team and also was on the Bears' basketball team. They reached the Final Four in 1946, where they lost to eventual national champion Oklahoma State.

Larner is the answer to a significant trivia question. He was the winning pitcher in the first College World Series game ever played, winning the 1947 opener at Kalamazoo, Michigan (the series was moved to Omaha in 1949). Among the hitters he retired was Yale first baseman George Bush, who is now the President of the United States.

After progressing as high as the Triple-A Pacific Coast League with the San Francisco Seals in a four-year professional career, Larner returned to coaching. He had begun his career at St. Mary's High School in Berkeley while still attending Cal.

Larner and his wife Kay live in Yorba Linda. They have two children.

After suffering its worst season in 15 years, Cal State Fullerton has reloaded and is primed and ready for the 1990 baseball season.

The current Titan club has a number of new faces and doesn't contain the premier players of the recent past, but head coach Larry Cochell feels the Titans can put it all together and challenge for the conference championship.

Second baseman Mate' Borgogno (.359, 14 doubles) and outfielder Rich Gonzales (.281, 3 HR) are the only position players returning from last year's 30-27 team. Fortunately for the Titans, the pitching staff wasn't hit as hard by graduation, the professional draft and attrition. Fullerton returns one of the league's best pitchers in lefthanded starter Huck Flener (3.66, 9-1). Also returning are relief ace Chris Robinson (2.97,6-5,2SV), lefty starter Rich Faulks (2.98, 2-2) and reliever turned starter Sam Colarusso (4.14, 4-3, 3 SV).

Fullerton graduated five starters from last year's squad: first baseman Rex Peters, third baseman Ralph Ramirez, centerfielder Bobby Jones and starting pitchers Danny DeVille and Paul Johnson. The Titans also lost two first-team All-Big West players in catcher Brent Mayne and designated hitter David Staton to professional contracts.

Coach Cochell is excited about the 1990 season, and the number of excellent prospects the team acquired in the off-season.

"We have a definite shot at win-

ning the conference championship, although it will be a close race," said Cochell.

Junior College All-American Matt Hattabaugh (Cerritos College) is expected to fill the big shoes of departed catcher Mayne. Sophomore Eddie Lample also will see playing time behind the plate. Pepperdine transfer Frank Charles is also a backstop candidate along with Fullerton JC transfer John Mele.

"We have good depth at the catching position," said Cochell.


Returning sophomore Bobby Kopenhaver is the likely starter at first base. Moorpark College transfer Steve Sisco and Charles could also see action at first.

Borgogno has a lock on second base and should contend for all-conference honors.

Third base will be occupied by newcomer Phil Nevin, a freshman from El Dorado High School in Placentia. He was drafted in the third round by the Los Angeles Dodgers but declined signing to further his studies and become not only a starting infielder for the baseball team at Fullerton, but a first-team All-Big West placekicker.

Starting at shortstop for the Titans will be USC transfer Kevin Farlow. Trevor Rush, a freshman from Thomas Downey High School in Modesto, will also see playing time at third or short.

Coach Cochell says, "We have a chance of having a very good defensive ballclub, especially in the infield."



Gonzales is penciled in to start the season in left field. Mota will start in centerfield and returning letterman Paul Bunch will start in right field. Also seeing playing time in the outfield will be redshirt freshman Matt McElreath, returning sophomore David Ayala and Florida State transfer Tom Manley.

Cochell says, "Domingo has good speed and will be able to track down a lot of flies in the outfield."

Flener, Colarusso and newcomer Jack Bailey (Rancho Santiago College) will make up the Titans' starting rotation with junior Robinson the ace out of the bullpen. Junior Rich Faulks, junior Matt Watson and sophomore James Popoff will be spot starters. Newcomers Doug Ketchen (Allan Hancock College) and Bill Fitzgerald (Katella HS) will be designated as middle relievers.

"Pitching will be the strength of our team if our defense plays to its capability," says Cochell.

Charles and Manley will most likely be the designated hitters for the Titans.

The 1990 season will be No. 6 for the Big West Conference under the current alignment which blended teams from the Southern and Northern California Baseball Associations and more resembles the football and basketball alignments of the institutions in what was called the Pacific Coast Athletic Association through the 1988 baseball season.

In recent years the Titan Athletic Foundation has played a vital role in the success and achievements of Titan athletics. It has been the source of the extra measure of excellence for both men's and women's sports as they have continued to bring recognition and distinction to Cal State Fullerton.

The University recently committed to a detailed project designed to upgrade athletic facilities. This included the construction of a sports complex to be completed by 1992 which will have a multi-purpose stadium for football, soccer and many other events; a new stadium for baseball; and improved softball facilities. Also planned is a gymnasium addition which will include additional seating for basketball and a new gymnastics practice facility.

The commitment to excellence has never been more apparent, and the foundation of an athletic program worthy of national recognition has been established - clearly, the MOMENTUM is building.

In order to keep pace with the level of academic excellence and to capitalize on the exciting changes being made in athletics, the TAF must increase its efforts and expand its sources of revenue in the challenging year ahead. As a state-funded university, our revenue and budget have limitations that require additional funds to support our student-athletes, the backbone of our rapidly developing program.






