

Cal State Fullerton - The University

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 41st year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 120,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and satellites in Mission Viejo and Santa Ana - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 25,000 students currently enrolled and more than 3,400 faculty and staff employees, it is estimated that Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by \$489 million annually.

Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 12th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduated.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on- and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus

artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fund-raising campaign. The center serves as an educational

and research facility for the study of successful aging.

Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President



Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of

Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

John Easterbrook, Director of Athletics



John Easterbrook is in his sixth year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department, which has seen continued and easily measured success during his first five years of leadership. The Titans have annually come out in the black budgetarily, on-campus facilities have been dramatically improved and the program continues to lead the way among Big West Conference rivals in post-season success as measured by the annual Sears Cup standings. Four teams have reached NCAA quarterfinals during his tenure topped by the 1995 national champion-ship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 60, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event

management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1962) in commerce and law and attended the University of Illinois Law School.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, four granddaughters and one grandson. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah,

Primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics, assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, women's basketball and softball, she accepted the position in May of 1992 after having served as both head women's basketball coach and interim senior woman administrator during the 1991-92 academic year. She is a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee.

Head coach at Fullerton for seven years, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record. In 23 years of coaching she amassed a 375-236 record.

Her best year at the helm of the Titans was 1990-91 when she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second-round of the NCAA Tournament.

Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coach-of-the-year honors in 1990-91. Notably, that year she was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession.

Currently, she is a member of the Athletics Council and the Academic Senate for Cal State Fullerton.

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.



History of Titan Softball

The history of Cal State Fullerton softball begins in 1979 with the Administration's decision to add the sport to the University's list of Division I competitors. **Judi Garman**, coach of the very-successful Golden West Rustlers, is hired while **Linda Shafor** is named the program's first assistant coach.

1980 Pam Edde, a pitcher from Utah State, and Pam Knox, a shortstop who played two years at Golden West and a season at the University of Arizona, transfer to Cal State Fullerton and a local product - Janet Lloyd from Tustin High School - commits to Fullerton and the upstart Titans are ranked as high as 7th in the coaches' pre-season poll.

After compiling a 37 - 29 season record, the Titans earn a trip to the Western AIAW regionals in Fresno, where the Titans eliminate defending national champions UCLA when UCLA makes an illegal defensive substitution in the bottom of the seventh inning. The Titans go to the AIAW College World Series in their first year and finish 9th out of 32.

1981 **Terry Keasling** and **Sue Lewis** along with new Assistant Coach **Jan Dunlap**, arrive at Fullerton and help the team to a 60 - 14 record including a sweep at the Western regional. They earn a return trip to the AIAW College World Series.

In the first game Janet Lloyd, recovering from knee surgery, hits a dramatic three-run home run in the bottom of the seventh with two outs and an 0-2 count to rally for a 7-6 come-frombehind win over New Mexico State.

In game 2, Terry Keasling steals the spotlight by pitching a two-hit shutout, striking out 13 batters and hitting a two-run home run in the bottom of the 15th inning to beat Western Michigan, 2-0.

Cal State Fullerton wins the College World Series of softball in 1986.



In game 5, freshman Sue Lewis hits a pair of home runs to defeat UCLA, 5-4, to advance the Titans to the Championship Game. (The Titans complete a six-game sweep over the Bruins in 1981.)

After losing to Fullerton, 6-1, to force the double-elimination tournament to a final Championship Game, Utah State survives a seventhinning rally by the Titans for a 4-3 victory. Cal State Fullerton finishes as the No. 2 team in the nation in only its second year.

Pam Edde, Sue Lewis and Janet Lloyd are named to the All-America team and Terry Keasling establishes the single-season record for strikeouts among Titan pitchers in a season, fanning 328 batters.

The 1981 team travels to Sweden at season's end, beginning a tradition of excursion excellence.

1982 **Kathy Van Wyk** joins the team when Defending Champion Texas Woman's University drops softball. She compiles an incredible NCAA record 33 consecutive wins in a season - still the record - on her way to a 35 - 1 record, with a 0.18 ERA.

The Titans compile a 55-6-2 record and earn a trip to the first-ever NCAA College World Series where Cal State Fullerton finishes 3rd.

Kathy Van Wyk wins the Broderick Award (national player of the year) and is named to the All-America team, along with Sue Lewis. Terry Keasling finishes her two-year career with a 13-3 record and her average of eight strikeouts per seven innings pitched still ranks her sixth on the all-time NCAA list for career strikeout ratio. Additionally, Lewis leads the nation in home runs and RBI - 9 and 50, respectively.

1983 JoAnn Ferrieri, Elise King and Su-

san LeFebvre begin their careers as Titans and Kathy Van Wyk becomes the program's third assistant coach. Cal State Fullerton finishes 56-15 overall and 17-3 in a tie with UCLA for 1st place of the WCAA Conference.

The Titans defeat the University of New Mexico in the West Regional to advance to their fourth-straight College World Series. They beat Indiana, South Carolina and UCLA to advance to the Championship Game against Texas A&M, where they lose to the Aggies, 2-0. It is the program's second appearance in the Championship Game in only four years.

Elise King and Susan LeFebvre are selected to the All-America team.

1984 **Debbie Mygind** begins her Fullerton career and combines with Susan LeFebvre and Lori Neff for a 54-12 record as the Titans qualify fortheir fifth consecutive post-season appearance. Although the Titans lose to

Defending Champion Texas A&M in the Western Regional, Titan Sue Lewis is selected to the All-America team for the third time. She becomes the only Titan to accomplish this feat.

1985 Terri Oberg begins her two-year Titan career. A return trip to the College World Series pits the Titans against their old rivals, the Bruins of UCLA. The Titans had already suffered a loss at the hands of Nebraska when the Bruins beat the Titans, 1-0, in a game which landed Fullerton in the No. 3 spot for the tournament. However, after UCLA beat the Cornhuskers in the Championship Game, it was determined that Nebraska had used an illegal player throughout the CWS. Although the NCAA record book doesn't reflect it, Cal State Fullerton claims its third No. 2 finish.

Debbie Mygind, JoAnn Ferrieri and Terri Oberg are selected All-America.

1986 Connie Clark and Chenita Rogers begin their careers at Fullerton.

After one ninth-place, one third-place and three second-place finishes, Cal State Fullerton finishes the 1986 season with the NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP. Behind the strong pitching of Susan LeFebvre, Connie Clark and April Jones, the Titans finish with a 57-9 record.

In Game 1 at the College World Series the Titans defeat Long Beach State in what proved to be the most difficult game of the series for Fullerton. Connie Clark pitches a four-hit shutout in the nine inning game. Alani Silva leads off the ninth inning with a double and Robin Goodin advances her to third. Rina Foster drills a single up the middle to knock in the winning run.

LeFebvre pitches a one-hit shutout over Cal in the second game of the series and the Titans beat the Bears, 3-0. The third game was highlighted by a no-hitter from Clark, her second of the season over the Aggies, and the Titans beat Texas A&M, 3-0. Riding a streak, Fullerton faces Indiana in one semi-final game and for the first - and only time in the series the Titans are scored on. But LeFebvre and the Titans prevail and take the game, 3-1, to set up the Championship Game - Cal State Fullerton vs. Texas A&M. Clark pitches a one-hit shutout and the Titans score in the fifth inning when Rina Foster triples and scores the winning run on a fielder's choice on the next play. Fullerton adds two more and wins its first national title, 3-0. The Titans tie a CWS record by going undefeated in the tournament.

Susan LeFebvre culminates a brilliant Titan career, receives the Broderick Award and joins teammate Chenita Rogers on the All-America team. Still the career leader in wins with 100, games played with 149, shutouts with 59, strikeouts wih 702 and innings pitched with 894.2, LeFebvre remains on the NCAA top 20 list for season-best ERA with a 0.23 average in her freshman season, 1983.

1987 Missy Coombes, Valerie Douglas and Carey Hess begin Titan careers and Connie Clark returns for her senior year. The Titans finish 59-10 and earn a trip back to the CWS to defend their championship.

Cal State Fullerton defeats Florida State 3-0 in Game 1 of the CWS to set up a rematch of the 1986 Championship Game, the Titans and the Aggies. In what many people consider the greatest softball game in CWS history, the country's two best pitchers, Clark and Shawn Andaya, pitch 13 innings. Deadlocked 0-0 through ten innings (including two tie-breaker innings), the Aggies got on the board in the top of the eleventh. But, in Fullerton's half of the inning, Foster opens at second, is sacrificed to third and, with two outs, Missy Coombes drives Foster in with an infield single. The effort continues deadlocked at 1-1 until the effort continues deadlocked at 1-1 until the winning run for the Aggies. After 13 innings, the 3 hour and 25 minute contest is over.

A tired Titan team takes the field the next afternoon and defeats Fresno State, 2-1. Going into the bottom of the seventh inning down by one run, the Titans rally with an opening single by Alani Silva. Michelle Gromacki reaches on an error. After a failed sacrifice attempt, the Titans have one out, Gromacki at second and Charis Monroe at first. Then, with one out, Cathi Hall, in the biggest hit of her collegiate career, doubles off the wall to score Gromacki. Chenita Rogers sends a sacrifice fly to deep right and the Titans come from behind to beat the Bulldogs.

Playing that same night, the Titans face familiar rivals UCLA. The Titans are unable to beat the Bruins and settle for a third-place finish. (Texas A&M goes on to beat the Bruins twice the following day to record its second national title.)

Connie Clark pitches every game and inning of the CWS and is awarded the Broderick Award, the third time a Titan pitcher has been given the honor. She is joined by Chenita Rogers on the All-America team, her second selection. Rogers leads the nation in hits with 89 and posts a .401 batting average.

1988 Marty Rubinoff becomes the fourth Titan assistant coach and Mich DeBree becomes a Titan. Fullerton uses four young pitchers throughout the season who combine for a 52-20 record and a third-place finish in the final season of the PCAA Conference. (The conference becomes the Big West for the 1989 season.) In a difficult West Regional, the Titans draw eventual National Champion UCLA and lose in a best-of three format.

Valerie Douglas is selected to the All-America squad.

1989 Ann Van Dortrecht begins her pitching career for the Titans. Fullerton posts a 47-15 record and finishes 28-8 in second place in the Big West. The Titans draw cross-town rivals Cal Poly Pomona in the NCAA West Regional and are knocked out by the Broncos.

Missy Coombes and Carey Hess are named to the All-America team. Additionally, Hess leads the nation with 52 runs scored.

1990 **Joy Tiner** becomes a Titan. The Titans finish 45-23, 22-13, good for third place in the Big West and draw Long Beach State for the West Regional. Both teams were ranked in the top five. After beating Long Beach State, 3-2, on the opening night, the Titans suffer a 4-0 defeat and then a difficult 2-1 loss in 16 innings to the 49ers. It is the eleventh consecutive year that the Titans compete in post-season play.

Joy Tiner and Ann Van Dortrecht are chosen to the All-America squad.



1991 Kathy Van Wyk returns as an assistant coach and **Tiffany Boyd** arrives at Fullerton and the tradition of Fullerton pitching dominance continues as she and Van Dortrecht combine for most of the Titans' 52-16-1 record and Cal State Fullerton fifthishes 25-9-1 in the Big West. Again, Cal State Fullerton qualifies for post-season play and for the second time loses a best-of-three series to Long Beach State. However, the Big West has three teams - Long Beach State, Fresno State and UNLV-representing it at the CWS.

Tiffany Boyd and Mich DeBree are selected to the All-America team.

1992 **Denise DeWalt** selects Cal State Fullerton and the Titans post a 45-20 record and a 25-11, second-place finish in the Big West. Tiffany Boyd is named Conference Pitcher of the Year and DeWalt is named Conference Field Player of the Year. But, for the third year in a row, the Titans are eliminated after qualifying for post-season play by Long Beach State in a best-of-three series.

Tiffany Boyd and Denise DeWalt are chosen members of the All-America team.

1993 **Traci Fischer** begins her career at Fullerton after sitting out most of the 1992 season as a medical redshirt. The Titans use four pitchers to combine for a 37-21 record and take second place in the Big West.

Fullerton qualifies for the West Regional and is sent to UCLA for another best-of-three series. The Defending Champion Bruins down the Titans and return to the CWS where UCLA loses to Arizona.

Denise DeWalt posts a .418 batting average and is selected to the All-America team. DeWalt's career .396 average marks the all-time best for the Titans.

1994 The "yellow ball" is introduced in collegiate softball. Three pitchers, led by **Jennifer Mortensen** and Trinity Johnson, combine for a 35-29 record and the Titans place third in conference play.

Participating at the NCAA Regionals at Cal State Northridge, Cal State Fullerton is a part of a four-team Regional. The Titans beat Washington in the first game, 2-1, then lose to Northridge in game 2. The Titans beat Washington again, 4-0, and Northridge, 2-0, to force a final showdown between the Titans and the Matadors. Johnson takes the loss as CSUN bests Fullerton, 4-0, to advance to the CWS.

1995 Chris Zboril begins her career as a Titan and Michelle Gromacki returns as the program's fifth assistant coach. Also, Melanie Roche becomes the program's first pitchingonly coach. Cal State Fullerton posts a 46-17 overall record and a 20-8 Big West mark, good for second place. The Titans draw a return trip to Northridge for the NCAA Regional with CSUN, Missouri and Illinois State. Shaking off seven years of regional frustrations, the Titans blast Illinois State in the opener, 9-1. and then beat Northridge twice, 1-0 and 2-1, to gain a berth as one of the final eight in the CWS at Oklahoma. The Titans beat first-place conference foe UNLV, 1-0, and then lose to twotime Defending Champion, Arizona, 11-0, and to Iowa, 6-5, to finish fifth.

Chris Zboril is named to the All-America team. It is Cal State Fullerton's 26th berth on the squad, and the 20th player so chosen. 1996 Susie Parra joins the Titans' staff as pitching coach. In this Olympic year, the Titans travel to New Zealand and Australia to participate in exhibition softball in an international setting.

On the strength of two young pitchers and a barrage of veteran offensive talent, Cal State Fullerton finishes 41-28 overall and 17-15 in fourth place in the Big West. The Titans bid, and receive, the NCAA West Regional and play host to Northridge, UCLA and Southwestern Missouri State. It is the 17th consecutive year that the Titans qualify for post-season play.

The Bruins and Titans meet for the first time in three years and for the first time in the newly expanded Titan Softball Complex. Chris Zboril leads off the game for the visiting Titans (by seeding) with a home run, followed by another by Traci Fischer and the Titans don't look back as they hand the Bruins a 5-1 defeat in front of a crowd of 551 for the afternoon affair. The Titans continue their roll as they greet Northridge with 9 runs in the first inning and an 11-0 mercy rule pounding. The first inning is capped by a Zboril grand slam. But the Titans' offense falters and their pitching inexperience shows when Fullerton loses its surprising bid to return to the CWS as the Bruins beat the Titans, 14-1, and 7-2, to advance to the CWS.

Traci Fischer is selected to the All-West Regional team and the Titans finish the season with a ninth-place Coaches Poll nod.

1997 The season features the most newcomers a Fullerton team has ever fielded, but the Titans go 29-26 on the year. Although the squad isdissappointed by not making postseason play for the first time in the history of the program, 1997 is not without highlights.

Donna Coombes throws a perfect game as the Titans defeat Purdue at the Florida Tournament and Fullerton goes on to capture the crown there.

The Titans get off to their worst conference start, 0-6, but never give up, battling to conclude the season with a split with Long Beach State, eventual Big West Champions. Second baseman Nikki Hart is named to the 1997 All-Big West Team, along with shortstop Julie

Williams. Outfielder Rachel Olvera is named to the second team and pitcher/utility player Jana Oetgen earns Honorable Mention.

1998 Prior newcomers with a year of experience under their collective belts, combine with a couple of new faces to provide one of the most potent offenses Cal State Fullerton has ever fielded. However, pitching continues to be inconsistent and the Titans go 32-29 on the year and miss post-season play for only the second time in the program's history.

Brenda Iglesias and Kristy Osborne earn All-Western Regional honors for their outstanding hitting and are joined on the All-Big West squad by **Dara Marzolo** and Hart for her second consecutive selection.

1999 Although Stephenie Little had arrived on campus in time to play for the Titans in 1998, it was her senior season, 1999, when she established herself as one of the nation's premier hitters - both contact and for power. And, if there was a word that summed up the 1999 season of offense for Cal State Fullerton, it was power. Led by Little's singleseason Titan record 23 home runs (and her .372 average), Fullerton pounds 54 roundtrippers (a new Titan team high), compared to their opponents' 23. The offense also sets Titan and Big West single-season records in doubles collecting 99 of them, led by Monica Lucatero's 18 (which ties her for No. 2 in the CSF record book).

The maturity of senior pitcher Jana Oetgen and the talent of newcomer Christy Robitaille mark the return of solid pitching for the Titans and the team although flirting with the conference title for much of the season after taking two of three from eventual champions Long Beach State in Long Beach — finishes the regular-season dropping three straight to Pacific and fall all the way to fourth in the Big West. However, overall record, the strength of schedule and the strength of their opponents' schedules land the Titans back in the NCAA post-season after the only drought in the program's history, 1997 and 1998. Fullerton receives a berth as the No. 4 seed at Regional 3 in Seattle, Wash., as 1999 marks the first time the softball post-season features eight, six-team regionals in an expanded 48team format tournament.

The Titans play their best softball in several years, pummeling No. 3 seed Tennessee in the first game, 12-1. Fullerton ties the NCAA post-season mark for doubles in a single game, smashing seven of them. Facing post-season nemesis Texas A&M (see years 1983-86), Fullerton gets great pitching from Robitaille and a save by Oetgen and win, 2-1, to advance in the Regional to face the host Washington Huskies in the winner's bracket matchup. The Titans battle the Huskies better than anyone at that regional - and better than most did all year and lose the heart-breaker, 1-0, in the 9th to the eventual NCAA runnersup Washington squad. Fullerton has to come back after a twohour respite to battle Hawai'i on Saturday night. (The winner of that game would have to beat the Huskies twice to advance to the College World Series.) The Titans wage another battle with the Rainbow Wahine-the two teams having met three times in the regular season with Hawai'i holding the 2-1 edge. This time the two teams get timely hitting and great defense to produce an 11-inning gem, but the Titans come up a run short and lose, 4-3.

Fullerton finishes the season 36-29 and Little earns third-team All-American honors—the 27th selection for CSF—and is the **Big West Player** of the Year. In addition to Little's first-team All-West Region honor, **Nikki Hart** earns second-team All West Region status. Both Little and Hart earn first-team All-Big West honors and are joined by Oetgen, Lucatero, **Yasmin Mossadeghi** and **Kristy Osborne** on the second team. Oetgen, **Dara Marzolo**, **Wendi Griffin** and **Stacy Pierson** are selected to the All-Regional team.

But, 1999 marks the season in which the Titans announce to the rest of the softball world, "We are back."

It also marks Judi Garman's last year as head coach as she announces her retirement after 20 years guiding the program. At the time of her retirement, she leads the nation in all-time wins. Her final Division I coaching record ends: 913-376-4 (.708).

Cal State Fullerton has produced a professional baseball player (Missy Coombes of the Silver Bullets) and several former players who are still involved with softball as international players or coaches, collegiate and high school coaches, athletic trainers or sports information

professionals. Titan teams and players have traveled all over the world as players or coaches and have influenced the international softball community with their knowledge and experience.

The history of Titan softball includes a National Championship, three second-place finishes, three Broderick Award winners (now called the Honda/Broderick Award), 27 All-Americans and dozens of all-conference and all-region selections. Additionally, it includes countless individual highlights and memories.

Cal State Fullerton is one of only five schools to win the NCAA Championship and has participated in post-season play 18 of 20 years.

A Tribute to Judi Garman

"...I've called you all here because I wanted to tell you two things. First, I am so proud of all of your accomplishments this season. And, second, I wanted you all to hear it from me: I've decided that this season was my last..."

Head Coach Judi Garman had called me to ask if I could attend a team "meeting" at a local pizza parlor after the 1999 softball season. I thought it was going to be a kind of routine, post-season gathering. Instead, it was to tell those of us present of her decision, to tell us words very close to the ones above. It's not verbatim, because at the moment that she said it, I began to flash back on all the years and on the 913 Division I wins which had landed Judi in the top spot in the record book for all-time coaches.

There are 156 women who have played softball at Cal State Fullerton under Judi Garman over the past 20 years. At first glance, a small number. But, I started to think about the players, the teams, the accomplishments and the stories. I started to think about whom I should get to write a tribute to her-some of her peers? Administrators? The three Broderick Award winners (that's what it was called in 1982, 1986 and 1987) who combined for a 188-29 record on the mound as Titans? The 27 All-Americans? Her current assistant coach and heir apparent who happened to be the catcher on her

1986 National Championship squad?

Then it occurred to me: I should write it. Not because it's my job to put together media guides and keep track of things like the all-time roster, but because I was not one of those significant players. I am, like so many others, simply one of those 156 women who share that one common element: Judi Garman was my head coach while I was a studentathlete at Cal State Fullerton.

I met Judi when she was coaching at Golden West College, having already won four consecutive national championships en route to a 211-40 over an eight-year tenure. It was 1978 and I played for a competing college. My car and all my gear (and several of my teammates') was stolen during a tournament which Golden West was hosting. When Judi heard of our plight, she quickly opened her equipment area and allowed us to choose gloves and cleats that we could borrow for as long as we were still in the tournament. (Now some of you are thinking, "Did she charge you?" Of course not - and shame on you.) Even when it became apparent that our team might have to face hers, there was no limit placed on the loan. "I'm just so glad I was able to help out," she said when we returned the gear.

A year and a half later, Judi became Cal State Fullerton's first head coach and I enrolled, along with a few key players from her Golden West squad, including the player whose glove and cleats I had borrowed. That 1980 team - a "ragtag" mix of junior college, high school and club players - rode Pam Edde and Michelle Dunn's arms all the way to the program's first College World Series appearance in Norman, Okla. We even won a game there, before bowing out in the double-elimination format. Did I mention we knocked UCLA out in the regionals that year on the strength of Judi's knowledge of every rule in the book? It's true. An illegal substitution cost the Bruins the game and gave us the initial lift we needed. And, it confirmed Judi's place as the game's best rule-book authority.

The next year saw the Titans' Terry Keasling fan 328 batters (still a record) on the way to a secondplace finish at the CWS (AIAW). Following that, Kathy Van Wyk arrived on campus and the Van Wyk-Keasling-Edde combination finished third at the NCAA's first-sponsored CWS, held in Omaha, Neb. Van Wyk went 35-1 (including a 33game win streak) and earned Cal State Fullerton's first Broderick Award.

Second-place finishes in 1983 and 1985 sandwiched a 1984 team which was knocked out of a CWS appearance by Texas A&M at regionals. It was the 1986 team that was able to bring the elusive firstplace trophy home, on the strength of Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark (the 1986 and 1987 Broderick Award winners, respectively) by beating Texas A&M for the national championship... But then, you can read all that history stuff in the subsequent pages of this book. What's it like to play for and work with the nation's winningest coach? Are the stories about her true?

Like all great coaches, Judi liked things to be done right. Like getting the bunt down, making the throw, using the right pitch at the right time, knowing the situation. Like having the bleachers cleaned before the nation's biggest softball tournament. Like making sure the book is filled out properly and that errors were assessed correctly.

Like players respecting the game, their teammates and their school.

But, other things set Judi apart. She really loves the game. She doesn't coach softball because she played it or because it's the sport that happened to stick. She really loves it, studies it and is its biggest fan. No one took more pride in the U.S.A.'s Olympic gold-medal winning team than our own Americanhearted, Canadian-born, Judi Garman.

No one embodies the strategic part of the game more completely than Judi. Doubt me? Ask any number of coaches who lost games because of those blasted rule interpretations.

And, if you think Judi's significance to the collegiate game stops at the Fullerton city limits, take a look at any roster of any top program in the nation. I'll bet there's an athlete on it that either attended a Judi Garman camp or clinic or was coached by a former player of hers or someone who attended a coaches clinic

And all the jokes that Judi would charge her own mother for a ticket to the PONY/Kia tournaments? They were made up. But her mother, Ruth, WAS there – always. I think the stories of Judi always working an angle stem from the fact that she possesses one of the keenest business senses around. She IS always working an angle, but it almost always makes great sense for both parties involved.

And all the jokes about the jokes that Judi tells? They're true. She ALWAYS has a joke for you or a piece of trivia.

And all the stories about her players that she tells? They're mostly true. Oh sure, sometimes the characters and locales get switched around, but with 156 players over 20 years it's tough to keep track.

And all the trips that she took her players on or all the things she insisted the team do, like visiting prisons or museums or factories or Pearl Harbor? It's true, she took us to all those places, because she believed it was important for college students to get out and see things, to experience, to learn.

Judi has decided it's time for her to "Go fishing" whenever she wants, to get out more and travel and see things and learn. And what are her favorite memories? The wins, the trophies, the All-American awards? No. It really is the stories of the 156 of us that matter the most to her. Nothing gave Judi more pleasure than hearing from a former player or getting pictures of their children. I suspect nothing will give Judi more pleasure in her retirement years, either.

Like that family who complains about mom and then fights to the death to protect her, the 156 of us who were lucky enough to be coached by her will probably continue to tell stories about our days playing ball for the legendary Judi Garman. The only difference is this: membership is closed at 156.

Head Coach Judi Garman - Final Coaching Biography



With her 20th season at Cal State Fullerton completed, Judi Garman's reputation as a mainstay at the institution and in the sport precedes her. Consider: Since establishing the softball program in 1980, the Titans have participated in post-season play every year except two; Garman has helped to raise over \$750,000 to provide opportunities for women in the sport; she is a sought-after speaker across the nation and abroad; many of her student/athletes have represented the United States in international competition. So with 913 wins over those 20 years-and as the nation's winningest coach-she has announced her retirement this year.

Selected as a recipient of the 1995 Woman of Excellence in Sports Award, Garman was honored by the Orange County community for her efforts to provide opportunity for girls and women to participate in softball.

Long regarded as one of the top softball coaches in the nation, Judi Garman saw that reputation permanently acknowledged on Dec. 4, 1993, when she was elected to the National Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Garman reached a milestone on March 7, 1996, when she won her 1,000th game — 1-0 over Long Beach State. (The first 211 victories came at Golden West Junior College from 1972 through 1979.) Her 848th Division I victory, which surpassed the NCAA-leading 847 mark previously held by UCLA's Sharron Backus, came versus Oregon on Feb. 15, 1998.

Her final Cal State Fullerton career record is 913-376-4 (.708) and her career mark is 1,124-416-4 (.727) including eight seasons at Golden West. The Hall of Fame induction was only the latest in a seemingly endless stream of honors and accomplishments for Garman.

Her inaugural team finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth in the AIAW Tournament. Since then, Garman's teams have won or shared eight conference titles and seven regional championships while finishing second in the College World Series in 1981, 1983 and 1985; third in 1982 and 1987; fifth in 1995 and winning the 1986 NCAA Championship. The 1999 team finished third (of six) at the NCAA Regional in Seattle, Wa.

Garman's accomplishments stretch across the continent from Canada to Santa Barbara to Golden West College to Cal State Fullerton.

She earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1966 and moved to California where she began working on her master's degree at UCSB. While at Santa Barbara, she started club softball and soon had a varsity team

Upon completion of her studies, she took the women's athletic director position at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached the volleyball, basketball and tennis programs in addition to softball.

Garman moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross country (1977-79). Garman coached the Rustlers' softball team to an unprecedented four consecutive national championships (1975-78) while compiling a record of 211-40 (1972-79). Twenty-one ofher softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions. Due to those outstanding feats at GWC she was named to the California Community College Hall of Fame in 1992.

An established player, she was a Canadian all-star outfielder and member of two Canadian National Teams - the Saskatoon Imperials. And, she was a member of the Imperial team which represented Canada at the World Championships held in Osaka, Japan, in 1970.

When she came to Fullerton there was no on-campus diamond. Her first five teams called a municipal facility at Lions Field their home diamond until an outstanding two-diamond complex with lights was constructed as part of a joint venture with the city of Fullerton.

Very involved professionally, Garman served a two-year reign as president of the National Softball Coaches Association from 1990-1991. Each year she has hosted clinics which bring over 200 coaches and 1,500 players to the campus. Additionally, she has produced highly successful pitching video tapes with acclaimed pitching coach Don Sarno.

In February, 1991, Garman was honored at the Fifth Annual National Girls and Women in Sports Luncheon sponsored by the Amateur Athletic Foundation of Los Angeles for her contribution to collegiate athletics in Southern California.

A popular speaker at clinics around the country, Garman has also made numerous trips abroad to Holland, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Japan and, most recently, Australia. She runs a camp each summer in Italy.

Fishing and snow skiing in Aspen occupy Garman's time away from the softball field. She also has numerous business interests.

She will remain involved with the softball program in an administrative capacity until her retirement from the university on her birthday, March 27, 2000.



Interim Head Coach Michelle Gromacki and 2000 Season Preview



From catcher on Cal State Fullerton's national championship team in 1986 to recruiting coach the past five years, Michelle Gromacki has been bred a Titan. She has also been mentored by the nation's winningest coach, Judi Garman, in preparation for this opportunity—the chance to guide the program which has meant so much to her. She will hold the title Interim Head Coach for the 2000 season.

"I have learned so much from Judi and am so appreciative of all she has taught me," Gromacki said. "From my time as a player through my tenure here in a coach's uniform, she has been a teacher."

And, now it is time to see how well the teacher has done. While it's true that most of the roster reflects Gromacki's recruiting ability, the test of her mettle as an on-field leader will be the challenge immediately facing her. However, it is a challenge which she accepts with enthusiasm and cautious confidence. It is also an endeavor for which she may be perfectly suited.

One of the United States' best catchers, Gromacki forfeited her spot as one of the nation's top-60 players on a trial team, thus giving up the chance to represent this country as a member of the 2000 Olympic squad. Through her national playing experience, she has had the chance to handle some of the best pitchers in the world and has directed the nation's best defenses. She has earned the respect of her peers in that role and certainly that experience

will benefit her in the role of head coach.

"My expectations for this team are that the entire roster contributes—in whatever way is asked of them—and that everyone stays focused throughout the season," Gromacki commented recently. "It's like I tell the team, 'You're not going to come to Cal State Fullerton to learn to make great plays. You come to Cal State Fullerton to become a better student-athlete, one who works very hard on the fundamentals and gives 100 percent so that you put yourself in position to make great plays'."

When asked how things might differ from Garman's guidance to hers, she responded thoughtfully, "I might play things a little closer to the edge than Judi did. I believe that you don't step in and succeed immediately until you've failed a bit. With that in mind then, I might find out quickly that being a bit more conservative was the way to go!" she adds with a smile, alluding to Garman's record number of wins on the Division I level (913).

But it's when she's asked to speak about her team that Gromacki's personality sparkles.

"This team is wonderful. It's true we have a lot of question marks because we are young, but we practice hard, seem to have great chemistry and have enough good veteran support to get us to where we want to be — a national contender."

As most agree in the sport, the game begins and ends in the circle. Great pitching is what is required to advance a team into the elite category. Gone from the team is veteran pitcher Jana Oetgen, who gave the team 48 wins in her three seasons, 21 of them in 1999. But returning is Christy Robitaille, who finished with a 10-10 record and a team-high five saves. (Her five saves ranked No. 5 in the nation last year.)

"Robitaille saw good time in the circle last year and grew into the collegiate game very well," Gromacki said. "She also pitched extremely well in a few games that were lost, but not because of Christy's efforts."

Games like at Fresno State

when Robitaille gave up only six hits and the Bulldogs, then defending national champions, capitalized for four runs. Games like versus Pacific when the righthander scattered 10 hits and allowed no runs until the 7th inning when a controversial shot, which appeared to be foul, was ruled a home run. Games like her Texas A&M win at regionals when Robitaille went 6 2/3 and scattered seven hits, allowing one run, before Oetgen came in to record the final out and advance Fullerton.

"All those experiences make Christy a great veteran even as she begins just her sophomore year. We need her to help accelerate the rest of our freshmen staff and I think we're in good hands with Christy in that position," Gromacki said.

The other pitchers are Gina Oaks and Jodie Cox and they come to the Titans after great prep careers and solid outside playing experience.

"But, the fact is, they're freshmen," Gromacki adds. "What I'm most thrilled about with this pitching staff is that they're not just pitchers, they are great athletes who will help this team in a number of ways. Both Gina and Jodie will see action when they're not in the circle. What characterizes this staff is competitiveness and I like that."

Veteran leadership begins with the three seniors, Jessica Maloney, Dara Marzolo and Kristy Osborne. Maloney, who has anchored rightfield for three seasons, and Marzolo will finish as four-year players for the Titans with considerable playing time between them. Osborne came to the Titans after a year at Fullerton College and after suffering a knee injury while at Oklahoma State. Consequently, she did not compete as a Cowgirl and returns to the Titans as a three-year player.

"Osborne is probably in the best shape of her life and has performed throughout the Fall with extreme consistency. She is the epitomy of a leader. Anything that has been asked of Ozzie, whether it be play first base, third base, act as the designated player or move over to second base as she will this season, she has responded and never let it affect her play," Gromacki said. "To me, she is the definition of a team player.

"Jessica has been a terrific asset to us in the outfield. She has the strongest arm in the outfield, makes good decisions and is in the right place at the right time. Without Jessica, we would clearly not have advanced as far as we did at

regionals," Gromacki said, referring to several outstanding game-saving plays Maloney made in Seattle.

"And, as for Dara, well I think she's very important for a number of reasons. Dara has caught and played third base for us and provides us with invaluable maturity. She understands the game and has proven herself to be a dominant hitter against many of the best. We need for her to stay focused and help Ozzie and Maloney in leading by example," Gromacki said.

In addition to the seniors, the Titans will see the return of centerfielder Rachel Olvera who suffered a season-ending knee injury early and sat out a medical redshirt year last season. She and infielder/designated player Brenda Iglesias make up the juniors on the roster who return to the program.

"Olvera's knee is sound but what is important in this phase of the recovery is to avoid the temptation to be tentative. And, that's tough. We were fortunate last year to have a player with the experience of Wendi Griffin (graduated) to take over in centerfield. This year, I believe it's critical to us that Rachel be in centerfield," Gromacki added.

Iglesias, who earned first-team All-Big West honors in her freshman campaign, came on strong offensively toward the latter part of the season and provided the Titans with more power.

"Was there a more dangerous hitter off the bench than Brenda?" Gromacki noted. "Early in the season she had to adjust her swing a little and then had to adjust her selectiveness because opposing pitchers knew her from the year before. It's always toughest after having such a phenomenal freshman year. But, Brenda will give us a ton of offensive support and her defensive abilities on the infield give us more options," Gromacki added.

Besides Robitaille, the sophomore class features two of the biggest offensive impact 1999 freshmen in the nation in Monica Lucatero and Yasmin Mossadeghi. Both players saw action in each of the Titans' 65 games, while Lucatero started all of them. Mossadeghi's improvement in the outfield throughout the season added balance to her impressive offensive numbers: a .316 average, with 60 hits, seven

home runs and five doubles, which culminated in a .453 slugging average. Lucatero, who led the Big West record-breaking 1999 Titans in doubles (99) with 18 of them, finished with a .282 average, seven home runs and 36 rbi. (Only All-American Stephenie Little knocked in more runs than Lucatero.) Lucatero's .471 slugging percentage ranked second on the team as well.

"I couldn't ask for a better sophomore class. If Yaz and Monica play as well as they did last season, they will not only help lead our team, but they should draw national attention." Gromacki noted.

As for the newcomers, besides Oaks and Cox who will see time in other positions when they are not pitching, the Titans add speed, solid defense and proven offense with the class of newcomers. Looking down the roster alphabetically:

Elida Gil De Montes was a late sign who will add support in a utility role in the infield. The freshman out of Bishop Amat H.S. missed much of the Fall due to injuries, but Gromacki remains convinced that she can help defensively and will come along offensively with time and opportunity.

Kristy Halagarda is a freshman outfielder from Mission Viejo H.S. who adds some much-needed speed to the roster, something missing in last year's team when Olvera went down. She will vie for a role in the outfield and could make a dynamic lead-off hitter if she can adjust to the better calibre of pitching.

"One of the most difficult things to replace from last year's squad will be the consistency of Nikki Hart," Gromacki discussed. "Nikki was a career .300 hitter who played second base very well. I'm not as worried about filling her shoes defensively, but you don't just easily replace a lead-off batter like that."

Amanda Hockett, a freshman infielder from Bakersfield, Stockdale H.S., has already drawn some lofty comparisons as she assumes the role of shortstop vacated by the graduation of Stacy Pierson.

"She reminds me of Denise DeWalt —and that's quite a comparison. I think by the time she finishes her career here, she will remind others of her, too," Gromacki said. "She has good arm strength, great mobility and her attitude sets her apart. Again, like other freshmen, she will have to prove she can hit at this level to measure up to players like DeWalt." (See record book section.)

Amy LaRocque is a freshman catcher and infielder out of Fontana, A.B. Miller HS. She and junior transfer Michelle Lehr (Long Beach City College) will both likely see action behind the plate, while LaRocque will fit into Gromacki's scheme on the infield as well.

"I can't say enough good things about how Amy and Michelle work with each other to make each other better and handle the staff at this point in time. I think their work ethic has been tremendous," Gromacki said of the two. "I had many expectations for both of them — maybe especially of Michelle because she is older — and neither one of them disappointed me throughout Fall practices. Michelle stepped in and provided solid leadership right away and Amy can help us in a key utility role as well as

working behind the plate."

Delaina Talili joins the squad as a sophomore after having competed at

Michelle Gromacki and new assistant coach Kelly Ford look on during Fall practices. Justin Kloczko, whose bio is found on the next page, joined the staff recently. Moorpark JC last year. She began practicing with the team in the Spring and is listed as an infielder.

"Here's what I'd like to say about Delaina: she swings the same size bat with the same bat speed as Stephenie Little. Will we see the same results? I think it's worth a shot," Gromacki said with a grin. Little finished the 1999 season atop the Titan single-season record book in home runs, was No. 3 in the nation with 23 of them, was ranked 10th in slugging percentage (.785) and was in the top 35 in runs batted in with 57 of them, for a .89 rbi per-game average.

Although there are no guarantees that Gromacki will earn the job out-right after the 2000 season, it seems clear the team will move forward under her system and with the help of new assistant coach Kelly Ford.

Ford comes to Cal State Fullerton after several years as an assistant at Big West rival Cal State Northridge.

"I feel very fortunate and excited to have a coach of Kelly's calibre working with us," Gromacki said. "She made a huge commitment to us in leaving a very good Northridge program and we will reap the benefits of her decision," she continued.

A nucleus of veteran talent, mixed with the eagerness of new talent and a new coaching staff. The question marks seem obvious and the cautious confidence seems well-founded. But the enthusiasm may set the Titans of 2000 apart.

"Kelly and I have the same philosophy about the hard work that it takes to contend," Gromacki said while her demeaner grew serious. "We are committed to helping these student-athletes fullfill their potential. We're going to stay focused on the things we can control and we're going to ask our team to stay focused on what they can control. Through focus, discipline, hard work and a commitment to the team, we should be able to build on the foundation which already exists and then move well beyond it."

With a broad smile returning to her face she added: "I imagine the process will be challenging for all of us, but exciting every step of the way."

and will assume the leading role in recruiting as the No. 1 assistant with the announcement of Judi Garman's retirement.

"We're so excited to have Kelly join our staff," coach Garman said at the time of Ford's hire (Aug. 1999).

Ford, 30, comes to Fullerton after a distinguished six-year career at Cal State Northridge. She began her coaching stint with the Matadors in 1992 and then assisted her former coach, Jim Beitia (now with Tennessee), for the 1993 season at Oklahoma before returning to Northridge in 1994 where she remained for five seasons.

"Kelly brings a wealth of experience, and it's a real bonus that she is so familiar with our conference

and with Southern California recruiting. Her enthusiasm and upbeat personality will mix well with our staff," Garman added.

Responsible for recruiting, hitting and coaching the outfield at CSUN, she will handle similar duties for the Titans.

"Kelly and I have such similar philosophies about the game, about the work ethic which is required to succeed, and about how successful we want this program to be," Interim Head Coach Michelle Gromacki said. "She is a spark plug and we are so fortunate to have her here."

"I'm very excited to be here," Ford said. "The facility, which is being built, and the student-athletes are two of the main reasons I am here."

Ford was referring to the construction work which is taking place at the Titan Softball Complex. The project, due for completion before the 2001 season, will include stateof-the-art seating and press facilities at the two-field site.

Additionally, offices and expanded locker room facilites will be added. A dining facility and an adjoining entrance with the baseball facility highlight the aggressive upgrades.

Ford replaces Rose Garces Prokop, who left the program to pursue private business opportunities.



Justin Kloczko joins the Fullerton coaching staff after two-

and-a-half years at the University of South Carolina Spartanburg.

A 1999 graduate of USCS, he was a baseball player at American River Junior College in the Sacramento area until a careerending shoulder injury forced him to retire from collegiate baseball. It did not, however, prevent him from playing men's fastpitch for the South Carolina Earhardt Motor Company's state championship team in 1999.

At USCS he was responsible for many aspects of coaching, including recruiting, calling pitches, organizing camps and clinics, conditioning, study hall and fundraising. He also worked in the athletics department as a facilities maintenance manager.

Since 1994 he has been active in ASA summer travel teams, having coached the 18-under California Rapids team and the Palmetto Power 18-under and 16-under teams in the South Carolina area.

Kloczko was born Oct. 28, 1974 (which means he shares the editor's birthday—but not the same year!).

Academic Assistance at Cal State Fullerton

The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Assistant Athletic Director/ Academic Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our studentathletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Services Coordinator Barbara Kempton and Academic Counselor Mike Miller.

Kempton has been at CSF for more than 30 years and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable.

Graduate assistants for the 1998-99 academic year are former Titan athletes Dirk Rassloff (basketball) and Tammi Bories (gymnastics).

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system – periodic grade checks – in place. It encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with course work and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSF take an average of four and a half years to five years to graduate and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist in selecting

> and registering for classes, referring students to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.



The City of Fullerton

The City of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first settlers were an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became part of a vast 35,000-acre grant of Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off the land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picture in

1887 when they heard rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They bought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.

Charles Chapman, a descendant of legendary "Johnny Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by introducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the Fullerton hills into what is now Brea.

The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman was the first mayor.

An airfield was established in 1927 and the Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation facility.

Another boom began as veterans returned from World War II and demanded homes for their young families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing the necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed.

Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was estab-

lished in 1913, and it was followed

by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, now part of Hope International University. All are within a 2-mile radius in the east part of town.

CSF Athletics Training Program

The athletic training program plays a major role at Cal State Fullerton in maintaining a student-athlete's health and in providing preventive medicine.

Director of the Athletic Training Program Julie Max is in her 21st year with her alma mater.

As the director, Max oversees the program which has received national acclaim for its curriculum

She was recently elected president of the National Athletic Trainers Association, the first female to hold the top elected position of the 25,000-member organization.

Her two-year term begins in June, 2000. Max had served the past six years on the board of directors and had a one-year term as vice president.

A recipient of numerous industry awards, Max was recently honored with the prestigious 1997 NATA Service Award, which recognizes outstanding service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.

The athletic training program

is administered under the school's Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion and involves 1,500 hours of practical work for each student before he or she can seek certification from the NATA.

One of the most popular majors for CSF student-athletes, it is regarded as one of the finest programs in the nation.

Cal State Fullerton supplies a large percentage of the certified athletic trainers in college athletics and for Southern California amateur and professional sports teams.

Why the Titans and Why the Elephant?

"What exactly is a Titan?"
"Why do you have an
elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the

same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however,

who related the name to

the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the

hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot,

the elephant
was unofficially adopted.
Several
revisions in the
caricature have
been made in
recent years to
create a more
tenacious Tuffy,
or Titus as he also

was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed as evidenced by the adjacent photographs. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

Currently there are two acceptable versions of the logo – a reversed, stylized full elephant for letterhead and a more cartoon-like character for athletic uniforms.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, originally favored by former Director of Athletics Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. To its alumni of more than 110,000, it's simply Cal State Fullerton.

History of the Titans' Athletic Department – OR – Not Bad for a 40-Year-Old!

As Cal State Fullerton celebrates its 40th Anniversary this academic year, highlights from the athletics department's accomplishments over nearly four decades command a major share of the spotlight. From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes including a perennial All-Starthird baseman and two rookies in the Super Bowl, numerous national coach of the year awards, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, a Miss America

candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans won gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to enjoy a 6-year National Basketball Association career and he currently is in his second full season as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women could point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to raise a young family and earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles

in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li- Xiao Ping. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, recently retired from the Los Angeles Dodgers. They won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. They were national runnersup in 1992 and a key member of that team, third baseman Phil Nevin, was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, posting a 57-9 mark en route to their third national championship. That team was led by Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the Florida Marlins and one of 28 former Titans to have played in the major leagues. Fullerton made its tenth trip to Omaha in 1999 under third-year Coach George Horton.

Five players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Olympians who have gone through the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games than any other coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 18 regional appearances. They

brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country. Sluggers Sue Lewis and Stephenie Little both starred in the Women's Professional Fast-Pitch League.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnerup finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by single-season receiving record holder Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen, the younger brother of Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Allen.

With the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has filled the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina, placing third.

There have been three subsequent trips to the men's NCAA playoffs highlighted by a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. The 1994 team advanced to the quarterfinals by hosting and winning the first two rounds. The 1997 squad posted an upset 3-1 victory over eventual national champion UCLA, part of a 3-game win streak over the perennially powerful Bruins.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994 and then won three events at the 1995

Big West Conference track championships. She was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year. The Titans have a rising star in sophomore Brandon Campbell. He became the first Titan to compete in the Pan-Am Junior Games and won a silver medal in 1999 while establishing a school record in the high jump at 7-1. He holds several other school records and also plays on the basketball team.

For the past six years, the Sears Cup has been awarded to the school with the most successful programs in terms of national finishes. The Titans placed as high as No. 46 in 1993-94 and their average place over six years (75th) is better than any of the other 11 institutions in the Big West Conference.
