Stroke-screening events continue in LV

No one has ever accused Leisure Village residents of not appreciating a bargain when they see one, nor have they been blind to their own health needs. So when the Leisure Village Neighbors Care Group — the people who bring you the monthly blood pressure screening — teamed with Community Memorial Hospital of Ventura to bring you STROKEAWARE, a series of free mini stroke-screening events, a success story was in the making.

The first session, held Jan.

14, was an over-subscribed success, with more residents showing up than could be processed, especially considering the space available in the Sun Room. However, five more sessions are planned.

The screening consists of

blood pressure monitoring, an EKG, blood oxygen level testing, monitoring blood flow through the carotid arteries, a total cholesterol non-fasting test and stroke risk factor evaluation. In addition, there

Realtors Corner: Short sales

The last-hour vote in Congress to avoid the "fiscal cliff" included an extension of the Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act, which is important to the current emerging housing recovery.

The Debt Relief Act, which was scheduled to expire at year's end, waives forgiveness of debt from being considered taxable income by the Internal Revenue Service.

The act has been extended through December 2013. This applies mainly to lenderapproved sales of properties where the current value and sales price are less than the mortgage balance. A homeowner who owes \$300,000 on the

mortgage and short-sales for \$200,000 would have been taxed on the \$100,000 difference as ordinary income, placing the seller in a higher tax bracket.

Homeowners who are considering a short sale or loan modification will be eligible for tax relief through Dec. 31, 2013, under the act passed in 2007 and originally scheduled to expire in

It is imperative that all homeowners looking to short-sale a property consult with their legal and tax professionals before proceeding due to the complexity of the Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act.



So you probably know by now that I come by my cooking skills genetically. My sister, who lives 3,000 miles away, writes about Jewish cooking and has done so for decades. I am not so specific, but I confess that every recipe my big sister has ever given me is always fabulous.

When she told me about "Brownie Pops," I thought she was getting too "grandmotherly" on me. She has six grandchildren and I've got none — yet. But I still love sweets, so I tried this recipe that comes from a new cookbook called "The Kosher Baker" by Paula Shoyer.

Are you old enough to remember the slogan, "You don't have to be Jewish to love Levy's?" That rye bread slogan was all over the New York area in the '60s.

Well, you don't have to be kosher to love Brownie Pops. And you don't have to have grandkids, either. But I think you do need to be young at

Brownie Pops

Ingredients:

Margarine, for greasing 16 ounces bittersweet chocolate, divided

1/3 cup canola oil

1 cup sugar

1/4 cup soy milk

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/4 to 1/2 cup finely ground nuts, coconut, sprinkles or colored sugar 48 lollipop sticks (available at

Pierce topic of film airing on LVTV

made by Pierce's son Mark, will air during a conversation between him and host John Baillie on LVTV's Viva the Village on Feb. 6 at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The presentation represents an on-air premiere of "B1719." The documentary chronicles the torture Charles Pierce endured in German death camps as a teenager and then his long, triumphant life in the U.S. Mr. Pierce died last October shortly after Mark completed the film. "B1719" was the Nazi tattoo on his father's arm for more than 70 years.

LVTV host John Baillie met Charles Pierce and his wife Libby, who still lives in the Village, several years ago. He describes Mr. Pierce as "phenomenal because he could tell his story without animosity or hatred. He spoke only of love and forgiveness."

Baillie says the upcoming TV segment weaves film clips from "B1719" with Mark's memories of his father.

also goes by Sweetie, the legal name her father gave her — recounts that her first full-time job at 18 was as a receptionist in a veterinarian's office. It didn't take long for her to move up to becoming a surgical assistant to the vet.

"I couldn't keep my hands off the animals," she remembers.

When her boss, Dr. Nathan Gale, became the director of the Los Angeles Zoo, Yvonne moved on to Hermosa Reptile and a unique career, even for an animal lover.

Hermosa Reptile was a company that offered many services for exotic animals. Primarily, it acquired and sold wild creatures to zoos all over the U.S.

"Cats — like pumas, ocelots, black

leopards — monkeys and snakes were part of our inventory," says Yvonne.
"My husband and I imported them — usually as babies — and then shipped them to the zoo customers.
Often, we couldn't put them right on an airplane, so they lived in our house for awhile."

That's why their bedroom contained more than 20 wood and glass snake boxes usually occupied with large, often poisonous reptiles.

The monkeys were favorites.

"They make great pets because they are like clingy little kids," she remembers.

A puma was a houseguest for awhile, as were two Malayan Sun Rears

She says she was rarely afraid in her work. On a trip to the Amazon River in Colombia to acquire more Cats—like pumas, ocelots, black leopards—monkeys and snakes were part of our inventory.

animals, Yvonne got lost from her group in the jungle and spent the night alone — up a tree.

"I was safe there and not eaten alive by the bugs on the ground," she says with a smile. She says she's never been bitten by a poisonous snake nor seriously hurt by animals, if you don't count the scratches and slaps by the frisky or scared cats and hoare

"It was a lot of work — feeding, cleaning, drawing blood to determine their health. The most unusual sale was a pink porpoise from the Amazon. As we flew her home, she gave birth, and the plane had to make an emergency landing to keep the baby alive," Yvonne says. "It was never boring. I loved it all."

Corporations bigger than Hermosa Reptile got into the business, and the company was closed. For awhile, Yvonne worked in traditional jobs until she turned 50 and became a competitive horseback rider.

Now in 2013, life is quieter. Her animal is a brown and white dog named Lady Macbeth.

She's traded the Amazon for Leisure Village Drive, and there's not a snake box in sight.

State-of-the-art fitness center on the fast track

Stand-alone, 2,000-square-foot building expected to improve property values By Patty Ecker

Making it easier to live up to the reputation as a vibrant, active senior community, Leisure Village will have a new, state-of-the-art Fitness Center before the end of this year.

The proposed stand-alone building will cover 2,000 square feet, contain more than two dozen new pieces of exercise equipment and is the result of nearly two years of research.

"This will be a fitness center, not a gym. A gym is totally different," explains Bob Scheaffer, LV general manager. "Our purpose is to help people stay in shape, to walk well, improve balance, get aerobic workouts, and stretch, not build pecs or flat abs."

He and others met with experts, went to other centers and compared 21st century exercise equipment before LV plans were developed.

The new brick building will be located in the west corner of the pool deck, an area largely unused by swimmers. The east wall facing the pool will be all glass. Inside will be an array of new equipment chosen specifically for the Village population: cross trainers for strengthening legs and arms, recumbent bikes that don't require stepping over a barrier to access, a cable pull to build muscles for everyone, including those who use wheelchairs. The new treadmills have TV screens with private speakers via headphones or iPods. And the design includes sufficient floor space for those whose exercise includes stretching on mats.

"There's enough room for a yoga class," adds Mr. Scheaffer. The suggestion for a new facility began two years ago with the committee that created the Village Master Plan.

"We've needed it for a long time," says John Mayer, who chaired that committee. "Villagers asked for it at our meetings, and we sent out a survey asking for input from people who use the center regularly."

It was clear the existing center was outdated.

"Ours is too small; the equipment is old-fashioned. Realtors tell us they are embarrassed to show it to prospective buyers," Mr. Scheaffer adds.

More than 1,200 keys to the center have been issued over the years. Daily attendance averages 160 people, according to sign-in sheets.

Dr. George Erb, a respected expert in physical therapy and exercise who owns a large facility in Camarillo, consulted on the project. Lifetime Exercise, a company that specializes in exercise equipment for healthy seniors, also contributed to the plans.

"We didn't plan this alone," says Mr. Scheaffer. "We want a state-of-the-art facility."

If plans proceed on schedule, the new Fitness Center should be up and ready for residents later in 2013. It will be constructed and equipped without a special assessment. Village funding will cover the \$500,000 cost.

LV Board President Jerry Rosen calls it "a major improvement" necessary to maintain the image of the Village, "enabling us to attract buyers and to improve our property values."



allowing some to extend over the sides. Grease with margarine. Break 6 ounces chocolate into small pieces and melt. Add the oil and sugar and whisk well. Add soymilk, eggs, vanilla and whisk again. Add salt, baking powder, cocoa and mix. Mix in the flour. Pour into pan and spread. Bake 30 minutes, or until the top looks dry. Let cool 30 minutes. Freeze 1 hour.

Melt remaining chocolate. Remove

brownie from freezer, peeling off foil. Trim sides, cutting into 1-1/2-inch shapes and small squares. Place a stick in each square and dip into the chocolate, covering well, allowing the excess to drip off. Sprinkle with desired decor. Place standing up to set. Serve on a platter or stand them up in a cup, bowl or small vase filled

Store it in the refrigerator for five days or freeze it for three months.


