WINTER QUARTER INFORMATION

PRE-REGISTRATION

Academic advising and pre-registration for winter quarter courses will take place on November 15-30. Each continuing student is asked to meet with his faculty advisor at a mutually convenient time within this two-week period to discuss his experiences this fall and fill out a Course Request card for the coming quarter. Any student who did not go through regular advisement in the fall should meet with his school dean or division chairman, or the Academic Vice President if he is a freshman, to secure assignment to an advisor. Students who transferred to CSB after taking some college work elsewhere are asked to bring copies of their Course Evaluation sheets to their advising session. Students not enrolled at CSB this quarter who have received admission for the winter quarter will meet with their faculty advisors and pre-register during the period December 1-12.

Spanish 411	<u>Advanced Grammar</u> Designed to meet the needs of those planning to teach as well as strengthen the Spanish of the Mexican-American. Course will feature intensive drills in all aspects of grammar, the writing of compositions, vocabulary building, and comprehensive exercises.
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School of Natural Science and Mathematics

MATH 546	<u>Special Problems in Mathematics Education</u> (Also known as Educ 546). Instruction in mathematical concepts related to specific problems in mathematics and mathematics education. Development of curricular units related to the problem under investigation. Prerequisite: Math 103 or consent of instructor.
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School of Behavioral Sciences

Economics 477	<u>Introduction to Public Choice</u> - will deal with economic activity in collective decision-making processes.
Political Science 477	<u>Political Stability and Change</u> - will examine interrelationships among social, economic, psychological, and cultural determinants of political situations.
Psychology 477	<u>Psychology of Aggression and Violence</u> - a reading seminar.
Sociology 477	<u>Family and Society</u> - will consider the family as a social institution in various cultures.
