

LV residents thanked for cooperation during major improvements



Thanks to the complete cooperation at all levels of Village life and activity, we recently completed some major construction without a single notable incident.

Our biggest chunk of that construction is the result of our 20-year street plan for the ongoing rehabilitation and maintenance of the 15.3 miles of streets and the approximately 326,000 square feet of parking area.

Aside from the water project, the biggest project this year was the removal and replacement of the surfaces of the East and West parking lots of the Recreation Center and the lot at the Administration Building. Included in that

project is the still-beingcompleted newly installed lighting in the lots, which should be brighter and more effective than the old lighting.

Additionally, Villages 5, 19, 40 and a section of Leisure Village Drive, west from Mountain View Drive to Village 7, were slurry-sealed as part of our ongoing maintenance. And, to enhance our street safety program, we restriped most of the Village after the asphalt work.

The total project took

approximately six weeks at a cost of \$420,000.

Still to come this year, we will work on the RV Lot as well as doing maintenance in Villages 37, 39 and Mountain View Drive from Villages 18 to 25.

On behalf of the Leisure Village Association, I thank all the members of the Leisure Village community for their patience and cooperation during these important infrastructure improvements and maintenance.

Easy summer salad offers flexibility

As soon as "outdoor grilling" weather arrives. I make this crisp salad almost every week. It's a nice change from lettuce salads and adds a cool, crisp taste to any hot dish meat or fish.

If you use regular cucumbers, peel and seed them first. If you use one of those long, skinny English cucumbers, you don't even have to peel or seed it.

This salad is great with grilled foods of any kind - our favorite is turkey sausages - and it keeps for a week. In fact, it gets better as it marinates!

This recipe makes enough for six to eight people, and company always loves it. But keep in mind you can eat it all week with other things! Experiment with dressings. My sister loves it with Wishbone's Red Wine Vinegar and Oil dressing, but I use whatever I have handy, and it's always great.

Crispy Summer Salad

Ingredients:

3 cucumbers peeled and seeded (or 1 English cucumber, washed) 1 small red onion 3-4 ripe tomatoes

Dressing:

Any bottled vinaigrette - or make your own with ½ cup red wine vinegar, 1 tablespoon oil, and season with salt and pepper or Mrs. Dash's, which is salt

Directions:

Slice cucumbers into thin "half-moon" shapes. Slice red onion into quarters and then slice into smaller, thinner pieces. Cut tomatoes into chunks. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add dressing, toss and refrigerate.



Real estate agent explains new homebuyer tax credits

The California Association of Realtors recently provided some updated information regarding the new homebuyer tax credits.

For California homebuyers, tax time is now tax relief time, too. Thanks to two recent laws, a California homebuyer may qualify for \$18,000 in tax credits for buying his or her piece of the American dream. The two tax credits are a first-time homebuyer credit of up to \$8,000 under federal law, and a new home credit of up to \$10,000 under California law.

The property purchased must be a qualified principal residence.

To qualify for the federal homebuyer credit, the

buver and buyer's spouse must not have owned a principal residence during the three-year period before the purchase, although the California credit does not require that the buyer be a firsttime homebuyer. California does require that the property must have never been previously occupied as certified by the seller. There is a minimum occupancy requirement in that the home must be the buyer's principal residence for 36 months after purchase, otherwise the credits must be repaid.

The federal tax credit does have an income restriction, but California does not.

seem larger than life. But Bill's life has been much larger than his acting career. He is a gentle and gracious giant of a man, boxing champion, weightlifting and arm wrestling champion, lifelong fitness enthusiast, scholar, professor, linguist, poet, and this list also goes on and on.

William Smith was born on his father's cattle ranch in Columbia, Mo., in March of 1934. As a youngster, he loved horses and was riding horses almost before he could walk. After the family ranch was devastated by the Dust Bowl, Bill's family moved to California.

Bill started acting when he was 8 years old as a studio extra, and he appeared in many films through his high school years, including "Going My Way" (1944) and "The Song of Bernadette" (1943). After high school, he joined the Air Force and served in the Korean War as a Russian intercept interrogator. He was awarded the Purple Heart in recognition for his service.

While in the Air Force, he studied at the University of Munich and the Sorbonne in Paris. He continued his studies after service, earning a bachelor's degree at Syracuse University and a master's degree in Russian Studies from UCLA. Bill is fluent in Russian, and he taught Russian as a professor at UCLA. He is also fluent in French, German and Serbo-Croatian. Bill continued in his doctoral studies but evaluated a major career-changing decision when he was offered an acting contract by MGM.

Bill accepted MGM's offer and turned it into a career as one of the best-known character actors of our time. In

his television roles, he earned critical acclaim for his performance as the sinister Anthony Falconetti in the television mini-series, "Rich Man, Poor Man" and its sequel, "Rich Man, Poor Man, Book II" (1976). Bill was a series regular in Hawaii Five-O (1968), where he played Detective James "Kimo" Carew. One of his best-known roles was in the NBC western series "Laredo," as Joe Riley, Texas Ranger. Bill also made appearances on Gunsmoke (1972) and Batman (1966)

Bill has also appeared in numerous movies, too many to mention. Some of the highlights from his movie roles are: "Any Which Way You Can' (1980) as Jack Wilson, who had a big fight scene with Clint Eastwood; "Conan the Barbarian" (1982) as the barbarian's father; "Red Dawn" (1984) as a Russian commander; biker movies, including "Run, Angel Run" (1969) and "Angels Die Hard" (1970); and as a vampire slayer in "Grave of the Vampires" (1974).

During his career, Bill worked alongside many talented and interesting people: Gene Wilder of "Frisco Kid," Connie Stevens of "Scorchy," Max Von Sydow of "Ultimate Warrior," director Robert Clouse of "Darker Than Amber" and "Ultimate

Warrior," Michael Dudikoff of "Platoon Leader" and "The Shooter," Mike Pataki of "Grave of the Vampire," Roger Mosley of "Sweet Jesus, Preacher Man" but better known for "Magnum," director and actor Bill Bixby, director Robert Aldrich of "Twilight's Last Gleaming" and "Frisco Kid," Nick Nolte and Peter Strauss of "Rich Man, Poor Man" and Jack Starrett of "Run Angel Run," "Hollywood Man" and "The Losers."

Bill met his wife, Joanne Cervelli, on the set of Cybernator (1991), where Joanne was a make-up artist. She is a charming, intelligent and articulate partner for Bill, and together they make a strong and inspirational team. Bill has a son from a previous marriage who is an addiction specialist; Joanne has a daughter who is an office manager.

In addition to acting, Bill is an accomplished athlete. He has received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Academy of Bodybuilding and Fitness. He won the Air Force Light-Heavyweight Weightlifting Championship. Twice he won the 200-pound World Arm Wrestling Championship. He has held the Guinness World Record for reverse curling his own body weight. He is skilled at martial arts and held a

31-1 record as an amateur boxer.

Bill is an-all around champion of many different endeavors. He has achieved fame and has the admiration of his many fans. He is well respected and highly regarded by those who worked with him.

When I arrived at Bill and Joanne's home to interview Bill for this article. I didn't know what to expect. As I hesitated in the driveway, Bill came lumbering out to welcome me with a warm handshake and a friendly welcome. Despite all the bad-guy roles, Bill is a good guy with a good heart. He has done much with his many talents, and I was honored to meet him and to write about him and his many accomplishments.
