

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand with press box. No credential or pass required.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

TELECOPIER: One will be available on a page-by-page, first-come, first-served basis.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONE: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton SID line -- (714) 550-9456 — are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling (818) 811-3204.

INTERVIEW ROOMS: Do not exist. Interviews must be conducted outside the locker room areas which are located behind the south end zone on the field level.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules, but only if requested at least four days in advance.



The University

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in newly completed residence halls.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and six certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the new Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing now with the construction of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the City of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex by mid-1990. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.





Administration



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public

university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 16 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School who currently holds a post-resident fellowship at the New York University Medical Center.

Athletics Department



Ed Carroll, Director of Athletics

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 38, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

One of Carroll's first moves was to upgrade the football schedule.

The Titans have played Tulsa, LSU and Florida in recent seasons and tackle West Virginia this season. With the new stadium complex now firmly on the horizon, Carroll has signed Colorado State and Army to home and home series. Road games at San Diego State and Georgia also have been added.

Carroll scored a hiring coup when he was able to replace Augie Garrido with equally successful Larry Cochell as the baseball coach. Cochell took the Titans to the College World Series in his first season and was selected national Coach of the Year by "Collegiate Baseball Magazine."

Building plans are being finalized and construction has begun indirectly on an on-campus Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball. A Marriott Hotel is being erected on campus and the revenue it generates will help finance the \$6.7 million athletics project.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

Titan Athletic Foundation

The Titan Athletic Foundation, or the T.A.F. as it is usually called, is a non-profit organization established solely for the purpose of generating financial and other support for the Cal State Fullerton athletic department.

Membership is open to everyone and the current rolls include not only alumni, faculty, staff and students but also a great many friends of the university, area businesses and respected community leaders.

Gifts received by the T.A.F. are used to provide a quality education for deserving student-athletes. The 1988 fund drive directed by Den Hood was the most productive ever with more than \$382,000 in cash pledged for 1988-89 scholarship aid.

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a voung institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their sec-

in 1961-62.

ond season, the Titans of coach Alex Omaley advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams have usually been factors in the PCAA race and have national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton also has competed twice in the NIT Tournament.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year but two including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently, Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals. The Titans won their first six-team regional and finished third in the CWS in 1988 under the direction of new coach Larry Cochell.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series in nine years. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and have been ranked No. 1 in the nation much of the past three seasons.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have won their share on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and now football is another topflight program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

The Nickname and Mascot

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that Spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged the crowd causing minor injuries and an early sign of a now-common liability insurance crisis nipped a tradition in the bud.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was adopted to join the unofficial elephant mascot.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletic director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains predominant in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the confusion.

To out-of-staters, the picture clouds quickly because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens, which is what most of the more than 50,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

Santa Ana Stadium

Cal State Fullerton football returns for a fifth consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium — commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field - Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates. After the 1985 season the Stadium's future was in doubt with approval of plans to raze it to make room for The Westdome, an NBA-size multi-purpose arena. But city fathers changed their minds and developers are looking to Anaheim for a construction site.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the "Bowl" is only nine miles south of the Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts a tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is the home field for Santa Ana (Rancho Santiago) College and all Santa Ana High Schools.

The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana (now The Orange County) Register.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level.

Sports Complex

The long-awaited dream of a permanent on-campus facility for Cal State Fullerton is approaching reality. On July 13, the Board of Trustees of the State University system approved the schematic plans for a \$6.7 million complex that will include a 10,000-seat football stadium designed for future expansion to 30,000 seats. Included in the project, due for completion in 1991, are a 1,500-seat baseball pavilion and a new soccer field and running track.

Currently under construction on campus is a Marriott Hotel and convention center. Its projected revenue will reimburse the City of Fullerton for the University's portion of the construction cost of the sports complex, which will be shared by Titan athletics, city recreation programs and other community tenants.

On July 1, 1988, the Pacific Coast Athletic Association marked the beginning of the league's 20th year by changing its name to the Big West Conference. The new name is seen as a simpler, more accurate description of the league's 12 member institutions — Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State, Long Beach State, New Mexico State, San Diego State (women only), San Jose State, UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara, University of Hawaii (women only), UNLV, Pacific and Utah State.

When the league was formed in 1969, it consisted of seven charter members, all of which were located in the state of California. In its 19 years of existence, however, the conference has expanded to include universities from states which are not on nor near the Pacific Ocean (Utah, Nevada and New Mexico). Because of this expansion, the new name will serve to better identify all of the conference's member institutions.

Recent highlights of the league's success include the 1987 NCAA basketball championships, when, for the first time ever, the conference had a representative in both the men's (UNLV) and women's (Long Beach State) Final Four. Last season, three of the league's men's basketball teams (UNLV, Utah State and UC Santa Barbara) were invited to the NCAA Regionals — the most ever for the conference.

Another first occurred in the spring of 1988 when three conference baseball teams (Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State and UNLV) received bids to the NCAA Regionals, with Fullerton and Fresno State both advancing to the College World Series in Omaha where Fullerton tied for third

Six conference teams were invited to the NCAA women's volleyball championship last fall and conference member Hawaii won the national title, making it the third consecutive national volleyball championship for the league (Pacific won in 1985 and 1986).

Four conference teams received bids to the NCAA Softball Regionals last spring (Fresno State, Long Beach State, Fullerton and associate member Cal Poly Pomona) and two of them — Fresno State and Pomona — participated in the College World Series with Fresno State placing second.

The champion of the Big West Conference meets the champion of the Mid-American Conference each December (Dec. 10, 1988) in the California Bowl in Bulldog Stadium in Fresno. It and the Rose Bowl are the only bowl games with closed-end agreements, annually matching champions of determined leagues.

Four of the seven contests to date have been decided by a touchdown or less with each conference winning two of those. When it comes to routs, however, the Big West has the edge with three decisive victories.

The game has been a virtual sellout the past few years. The game is staged by the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association to benefit the Valley Children's Hospital.



Head Coach Gene Murphy



One of Gene Murphy's stated objectives when he became the Cal State Fullerton football coach in 1980 was to build some tradition. Now, eight eventful seasons later, Murphy is one of the traditions of a program still in its "teen" years.

Murphy's homespun sense of humor, his ability to turn negatives into positives and his genuine concern for assistant coaches and players have been the constant threads holding together a football program that has outperformed its resources. He has received coaching offers from more established institutions, but he has remained a Titan.

Not that his success at Fullerton has liberally greased the skids. An on-campus stadium remains on the horizon, the schedules get tougher all the time (LSU and Florida in 1987, Georgia in 1991) and the recruiting battles for southern California football products grow keener each year. But through it all, the Titans have remained more than competitive. Only one losing record mars the last five seasons, a period that features a pair of Pacific Coast Athletic Association championships (1983 and 1984).

While Dick Coury (1970-71) brought Titan football into the world, Pete Yoder (1972-74) nursed it into adolescence and Jim Colletto (1975-79) guided it into Division I status, 49-year-old Eugene Vincent Murphy has guite literally built the Cal State Fullerton football program. He and his staff remodeled an old home for an office complex (Football House), constructed their own weight training facility (Titan Pete's Bulk House in honor of Fullerton contractor Ray Peterson), arranged a fall training camp through the cooperation of Frank Frobisher at Pacific Christian College and even erected their own stadium (Titan Field, on-campus bleachers, 1980-82).

It's been an 'us' against the world existence.

"I've said it many times, but it's true. The only people we have to gratify is us - the Titan football family," says Murphy. "I'm a Titan. It doesn't get any easier, but I think the program has improved enough to sustain itself."

The University has responded with a full allotment of assistant coaching positions, a football secretary and a scholarship count approaching the NCAA Division I maximum. And soon, with the help of Mayor Dick Ackerman and the City of Fullerton and the Marriott Hotel chain, the longawaited stadium will become reality.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has sent the Titans out to play at four different "home" sites during his tenure. "We are very pleased with our arrangement at the

Santa Ana Bowl, but playing on campus in our own facility will be the ultimate."

The Marriott Hotel is being built on campus with portions of the land lease and bed tax offsetting the construction and maintenance costs to the city of a football/soccer/baseball complex that will be shared by the community. Until then (projected for 1991 season), the Titans will remain the nation's road warriors with away games at West Virginia, Wyoming, Akron, Southwest Louisiana and the like substituting for home dates.

Although it took four years for the results to show up on paper - in the won/lost column - Murphy's improvement of the Titan program began that January day in 1980 when he first set foot on the Fullerton campus.

"We had to go back to square one - erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building facilities, everything - to build a broad base.

"And from day one we had to build the self-image of the Titan progam. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate."

Murphy, second only to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney in seniority in the Big West, came to Fullerton from the University of North Dakota to "throw the football." His early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagful of trick and gadget plays, all known collectively as the "squirrel derby" offense. But he has adjusted almost annually to the changing personnel.

The 1983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn and ball-hawking defense while the 1984 squad put it all together: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game and an aggressive defense that was No. 2 in the nation in creating turnovers. In 1985, the defense carried the load despite numerous injuries until the young offensive unit came together with the aid of a reach back into the "squirrel" bag. In 1986 it was a relentless running game that bore the burden of trying to control the ball for an inexperienced passing game — offensively and defensively. And last year a balanced offense carried the load until a new defensive scheme jelled.

Consistent through an eight-year Fullerton record of 45-48 has been the importance Murphy

has placed on special teams play.

"We feel the game is divided into three phases — offense, defense and special teams," says Murphy. "If you can win two of the three, you've got a pretty good chance to win the football game. So we spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service. We fell off in those areas in 1986 and that was one of the main reasons we had a losing season."

Murphy's rewards have included the 1983 PCAA Coach of the Year Award and in 1984 he was selected United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year.

"Those awards are nice, but it's the coaches and the players who deserve the credit," says Murphy.

Born on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey, Murphy was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

After attaining his bachelor's degree (double major of physical education and social studies) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND, where he stayed 14 more years — the first 12 as an assistant and eventually as offensive coordinator and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three post-season bowl games (1966, 1972 and 1975). As head coach, he won the conference title in 1979 and was named conference coach of the year. The Fightin' Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Division II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 60-55.

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as an assistant "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned

down opportunities to return to the Canadian League.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in

1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy has two sons. Tim, 22, is in his senior year at Cal State Fullerton and works for the athletic equipment room and sports information office. He also plays on the CSF club ice hockey team. Michael, 18, graduated from Esperanza High School in Anaheim in June and will be a freshman at Fullerton this fall.

"Snuse" - smokeless tobacco

"Son of a Buck" - see "stallion," but ornery

"Sorp" - someone from South Dakota

"Spudbutt" - physical description of a football player, typically big but slow and indigenous to the upper Midwest... currently being artificially harvested in the Titan weight room

"Squirrel derby" - Murphy's offensive philosophy that carries over into special teams play... men in motion, passes from and to all backs... end arounds, flea flickers, fake punts and gadget plays still to be devised

"That's Us" - all encompassing exclamation when something goes wrong away from the gridiron like a late bus... being bumped from an airliner... locked stadium gates... photo day bleachers stolen... kicked out of Anaheim Stadium the morning of a game, etc...

"Yewper" - someone from Northern Michigan

Larry Manfull was reunited with Gene Murphy in 1980 at Fullerton and the development of his offensive line has paralleled the increased success of the entire Titan program... the only remaining member of Murphy's original Titan staff... The Original "Hogs"

The nickname "Hogs" for offensive linemen gained national recognition a few years back as John Riggins and a group of mammoth blockers led the Washington Redskins to a Super Bowl victory.

However, the Redskins were more than a decade late with the term. The creator: Larry Manfull, now in his eighth year as the Titans' offensive line coach.

"The story unfolds back in 1969 when I was the head coach at Hollister High School in central California," recalls Larry, affectionately known as "the Hogmaster." "I was hunting wild boar and came across a group of six. Among them was one of the largest boars I had ever seen. His tusks seemed to touch the ground. I estimated his weight at 300 to 400 pounds.

"I scoped the group and as I laid the crosshairs on his upper right shoulder and squeezed the trigger, the results were scary.

"The boar jumped straight into the air, landed on the ground, turned three complete circles and charged my pick-up truck. After a few seconds of utter amazement, I put the crosshairs on his chest. My 257 exploded and about 150 yards away, the Hog went down. He appeared to be dead.

Wrong. The Hog got up and charged the truck again. I leaped into the bed and fired my remaining cartridge. The Hog went down, but he got up again and charged the truck once more. He rammed the side of the truck, quivered and fell dead.

"I stood in the back of the truck in shock. The boar truly was dead this time, but I started to think about that animal and what he was made of.

"I got out of the bed and pulled the Hog by the tusks away from the dent he had put in the rear fender. I saw that my first shot had grazed his back and sent him into a state of fury, charging in the direction of the sound from the gun shot. My second shot was in his right shoulder and the third shot was directly in the middle of his chest. I am sure the Hog was virtually dead when he got up from the last bullet and charged the truck.

"I took the Hog home, skinned and quartered him and he provided many great meals. Now, each time I eat pork, I think of that boar and tip my fork in respect.

"That boar was the ultimate in all the things I think a football player should be on the field. He was the toughest animal or person I had ever seen. He never quit, even after he was hurt or, in my opinion, even dead. He had the killer instinct, he was strong and aggressive and he had character and pride.

"My linemen are charged with the responsibility to uphold the reputation of the "Hogs" that played in 1969 and since then."

In honor of their nickname, every "Hog" has a T-shirt to wear away from the field featuring a ferocious hog in a design created by tight end Jim Thornton.

Titan Pete's Bulk House

A monument to the success of Gene Murphy's coaching and entrepreneurial skills rests a few yards to the north of the Football House - "Titan Pete's Bulk House."

Named after former Booster Club president Ray Peterson, the "bulk house" is Fullerton's five-year old weight training facility. Built by donated labor and materials and specially designated monetary gifts, the "bulk house" is the symbol of the "growing" Fullerton football program.

Unable to consistently recruit the polished, large linemen necessary to compete on the Division I-A level, Fullerton builds its own - by recruiting lanky high school seniors with large frames and the desire and dedication to spend countless hours in the "bulk house" to build themselves into PCAA championship calibre physical specimens.

Three prime examples of this process are former offensive tackles Daren Gilbert and Hank Goebel and tight end Jim Thornton. Gilbert and Goebel were high school basketball players in the 225-pound range. They ended their Titan careers in the 275-pound range and as NFL draft picks — Gilbert on the second round to New Orleans in 1985 and Goebel to the L.A. Rams on the eighth round in 1986.

Thornton came to Fullerton in 1983 as a 200-pound quarterback. Two years later he was converted to tight end and by 1988 he was a 250-pounder playing in the Hula Bowl and becoming a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Chicago Bears.

On the Road Again

Willie Nelson's hit recording of the early 1980s has become the Titan football theme song as coach Gene Murphy has taken his team to most of the airports in the western United States. In his eight seasons, Murphy is 19-11 at a combination of four home sites, 24-38 on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl). The 30 home games represent only 32 per cent of his 93 total games, which included one streak of 10 consecutive road contests (last six of 1980 and first four of 1981).

But, it will get better and it has been worse.

The beginning of construction of a Marriott Hotel on University property is the first concrete (no pun intended) step towards a long-awaited on-campus stadium that will permit the scheduling of more home games beginning in 1991.

The ratio was much worse in Fullerton's first five years of Division I play, when the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The home record was 8-9 in that period while the road mark was 9-29.





A Team for All Time Zones

The 1987 Titan football season was a study in contrasts. The team traveled as far west as Honolulu and as far east as Gainesville, Florida. The Titans played before as many as 73,452 fans and as few as 2,013. They played on astroturf, beautifully manicured grass, dirt and mud. They had laughers and narrow victories and frustrating as well as embarrassing losses. They broke passing and receiving records and set marks for being penalized.

Fittingly, they finished with an even ledger — six wins and six losses.

"Our goal was to have a winning season and it was realistic, despite the schedule," reflected coach Gene Murphy. "In that respect, it was disappointing, to be so close. But we didn't have a losing record, either, and I guess what we will remember most is winning the last game — the momentum that carried over to Spring."

It was a year of traveling, a rude introduction to the Southeastern Conference and a seemingly psychic passing combination of Ronnie Barber and Todd White. The best running back had gained only 46 yards in his career prior to the season and the most flamboyant defender hadn't seen a

practice field since high school.

The year began ominously with 44-0 and 56-12 losses at Hawaii and LSU, respectively. The latter was something of a moral victory, however, as the Titans traded first-half scoring drives with

a nationally ranked SEC team in front of the largest crowd ever to see Fullerton play.

All of that was forgotten when the team bounced back to beat rival Long Beach State at home and then run its winning streak over Utah State to five in a row with a comfortable victory at Logan. Hopes of a PCAA championship and a trip to the California Bowl were dashed in a mistake-filled loss at San Jose State and then mere survival was the only goal left after a 65-0 loss at Florida.

Again, the Titans bounced back with a vengeance and more than pleased a Homecoming crowd by ending a 15-year victory drought against UNLV. The momentum began rolling with a heart-stop-

ping victory at Northern Illinois and a rout of New Mexico State.

Then came a frustrating loss at Fresno State when Fullerton couldn't gain less than a foot on critical goal-line and fourth-down plays. An equally tough loss followed at home vs. Pacific, when the Titans outgained the Tigers by more than a 3-to-1 margin but made every error in the book to deprive themselves of a shot at a winning season.

An offensive shootout with Montana brought the season to a victorious close and assaulted the school record book. Quarterback Ronnie Barber finished up as the No. 2 Titan in most passing and total offense statistical categories despite playing only two seasons. Todd White erased virtually every pass receiving and punt return standard. The highlights:

The Titans opened the 1987 season on a typically muggy night in Honolulu and got mugged by an inspired Hawaii team playing hard for new coach Bob Wagner. The Rainbow Warriors unveiled a new combination option and run-and-shoot offense that the Titans were unable to prepare for and a confused defense was riddled for 598 yards of total offense.

Penalties marred a first quarter that saw both teams sparring in their first contact in nine months against strangers. The Titans couldn't capitalize on a recovered fumble near midfield and a second recovery was nullified by an offsides penalty. Hawaii got untracked in the second quarter and QB Warren Jones scored one TD. A second chance after a bad Titan punt snap was thwarted by Jones' fumble at the Fullerton 6-yard line but Hawaii scored twice in the last 4:28 on drives of 81 and 61 yards.

Carlos Siragusa got the call at QB in the second half for the Titans and his first play, an 11-yard sack, set the tone for the rest of the night. With All-American Al Noga fueled to a frenzy by an enthusiastic crowd of 45,408, the physically dominating Hawaii defensive line stymied any Fullerton offensive ploy. The Titans totaled only 100 yards of offense, losing 61 yards on bad long snaps.

The Titans ventured into "big-time" football, Southeastern Conference style, in the tradition-steeped confines of Tiger Stadium on the LSU campus in Baton Rouge and came away duly impressed. Despite a thunder and lightning show that delayed the kick-off 30 minutes, 73,452 fans showed up to comprise the largest crowd ever to see Cal State Fullerton play football.

For one half, they saw an entertaining contest. While the Fullerton defense couldn't stop Tom Hodson, Wendall Davis and Harvey Williams, the offense moved the ball well against the No. 6-ranked Tigers. The two teams traded scores in the first half, but with the Tigers scoring touchdowns and the Titans countering with a school record four field goals by newcomer Stan Lambert, there was a 35-12 halftime margin.

The second half was all LSU on both sides of the football and the Tigers completed the game without punting, giving up the ball only on a fourth-quarter fumble and the final gun.

The Titans rebounded from a pair of opening road losses by a combined count of 100-12 to open PCAA play with an impressive win over a previously unbeaten Long Beach State team. The win was Gene Murphy's fourth over the 49ers in five tries.

The tone was set early when the Titans took the opening kick-off and marched methodically down the field. On the 17th play of a 95-yard drive, Jim Thornton caught a 7-yard TD pass from Ronnie Barber. CSF would control the ball for 83 plays and more than 41 minutes despite setting a school record with 16 penalties.

Long Beach countered with a score early in the second quarter, but the Titans retaliated immediately. Michael Moore returned the kickoff 46 yards and a piling on penalty set up the Titans at the 49er 37-yard line. Seven running plays later, Eric Franklin scored from the 8 on his sixth carry of the drive for a 14-6 lead that was extended to 17-6 before the half on Stan Lambert's 20-field goal.

Barber's fumble and intercepted pass thwarted the Titans in the third quarter, but Tracey Pierce scored early in the fourth quarter for a 24-6 lead. The 49ers retaliated in two plays but the Titans countered with a 5-play, 48-yard scoring drive to clinch it.

Facing a Utah State team that was playing what coach Chuck Shelton called its "biggest game of the year," the Titans came away with the second most impressive PCAA road victory of the Gene Murphy era.

Fullerton controlled the ball for two-thirds of the first half but had only three Stan Lambert field goals to show for its efforts. The Aggies, who had to punt on all five first-half possessions, marched to a field goal on their first chance after intermission and when they forced a quick Fullerton punt, they had a chance to take the lead.

The Titans took a second step into Southeastern Conference football and unlike at LSU, where the Titan offense scored on four first-half possessions to keep it interesting, this was no contest.

The No. 17-ranked Gators unleashed a ferocious defense that kept the Florida offense and Heisman Trophy candidates Kerwin Bell and Emmitt Smith in Titan territory all day. The Titans never penetrated the Florida 39-yard line and they ultimately suffered the second worst defeat in school history in front of 72,336, second only to the crowd at LSU in Titan annals.

Florida native William Robinson was the bright spot for Fullerton, running for 36 yards on 6 carries. The most bizarre statistic of the game was that Titan kicker Stan Lambert never saw action. The Titans received both the opening and second-half kickoffs, never needed a point-after attempt and never got within field-goal range.

Actually, the Titan defense played relatively well, containing big plays by the Gators. They limited freshman sensation Smith to 130 yards on 22 carries with a long of 17. Bell threw for 135 yards with a long of 28.

Fullerton snapped a 15-year dry spell vs. UNLV with a 28-14 Homecoming victory in Santa Ana. The Titans had lost nine in a row on the field to the Rebels, who joined the PCAA in 1982. The victory featured some record-breaking performances and enabled the Titans to move into sole possession of second place in the PCAA.

Wide receiver Todd White set school standards with 12 catches for 203 yards and tied the school mark with three receiving TDs. Quarterback Ronnie Barber established a then personal best when he threw for 279 yards. The first of Barber's three touchdown passes to White culminate ad 15-play, 80-yard drive. A 32-yard completion to Jim Thornton set up a Barber sneak midway through the second quarter.

Another Barber scoring pass to White after a Harold Jones pass interception countered a second-quarter UNLV TD. But the Rebels closed to within a touchdown again late in the third quarter and had a chance to tie after an Eric Franklin fumble at the Titan 28. But walk-on cornerback Sean Fernandes intercepted back-up QB Richard Williams in the end zone and the Titans finally put the game away with an 11-play, 80-yard TD drive.

Ickey Woods, who would lead the nation in rushing, netted 115 yards but UNLV gained only 87 yards on 32 pass attempts and the Titans intercepted five to tie a school record.

The host Huskies scored a touchdown with no time remaining and got within one yard of a game-winning two-point conversion before roverback Chris Wright was able to drive Keith Hurley out of bounds and preserve the victory.

Played on a cold, windy grey day, it was a game with two different halves. Fullerton dominated the initial one, building a 14-3 lead and holding the NIU wishbone, one of the nation's most productive running games, to only 103 yards. It was another story after intermission.

The Huskies drove the length of the field only for John Ivanic to miss a 22-yard field goal. The Titans went the other way but failed to put the game away when Marc Hill fumbled at the NIU 13-yard line. From then on, NIU dominated, finally tying the game after intercepting a Ronnie Barber pass at the Fullerton 33-yard line.

But Fullerton responded with a length of the field drive featuring a 31-yard Todd White run on a reverse. The Titans made a critical fourth-down conversion at the NIU 4 and it took the touchdown and PAT to survive NIU's 54-second, 61-yard TD drive that featured a 22-yard pass play to the CSF 1 with one second remaining.

The Titans avenged a defeat at Las Cruces a year earlier with the most lopsided victory over the Gene Murphy era.

Fullerton took the opening kick-off and scored six plays later on a bomb to tight end Jim Thornton to set the tempo. A penalty and an Eric Franklin fumble thwarted the next two Titan possessions, but Fullerton then exploded for three touchdowns in less than five minutes.

After Bill Bryan forced and recovered a fumble at the Aggies' 8, Mike Schaffel ran in from three yards on the "swinging gate" play out of field-goal formation. Four plays later, Jeff Hipp recovered a blocked punt and ran nine yards for a score. After a successful Aggie punt, the Titans ran the ball 39 yards in five plays for a commanding 28-0 lead.

The Aggies lost starting QB Phil Vinson for the season shortly before halftime and the Titans lost Thornton for the year to a knee injury incurred on an extra-point kick.

New Mexico State's 24-21 home win over Fullerton in 1986 remained their only PCAA victory in four years in the league.

Coach Gene Murphy ranked this loss second in frustration only to the 1984 defeat at Las Vegas that ruined an unbeaten season. The Titans were unable to overcome a boisterous Bulldog Stadium crowd and 14 often critical penalties and officially fell out of the California Bowl race.

The Titans gained an early 10-0 lead and preserved it for 26 minutes. Then the roof fell in as 28 of the game's 38 point were scored in the next three minutes.

Dave Telford threw a couple of bombs for a 14-10 Fresno lead but Michael Moore countered with a remarkable 93-yard kick-off return for a touchdown. But Fullerton had to kick-off from its own 15-yard line after two penalties and the Bulldogs were able to navigate 49 yards to a goahead score that would prove decisive in a scoreless second half.

The Titans couldn't score on four plays inside the Fresno three in the third quarter and came up short on a fourth-down try at the FSU 25 with 6:48 to go. Their last-gasp opportunity started inside their own 1-yard line with 3:36 to play after a Barry Belli punt took a Bulldog bounce. They advanced to their own 40 before a devastating offensive pass interference penalty forced a third and 21 situation that resulted in an Eric Franklin fumble.

The Titans needed to close the season with two victories (or one win and a tie) to log their fourth winning campaign in five years, but a truckload of mistakes produced a loss almost as frustrating as the Fresno loss.

It was a textbook case of self-destruction. The litans threw three interceptions, lost three fumbles, committed a school-record 16 penalties (for the third time in the season), missed a 26-yard field total and dropped a pass in the end zone.

Pacific was outgained by 305 yards, but commited 14 fewer penalties and had only one turnover. The Tigers needed to drive only 24 and six yards for their first two touchdowns and a Fullerton personal foul penalty aided their 64-yard march late in the first half that proved decisive.

The statistics of a scoreless third quarter summed it up: CSF ran 25 plays for 144 yards while UOP ran 3 plays for 8 yards.

Fullerton had one last chance for a tie. A 10-play march moved the ball from the Titan 30 to the UOP 3-yard line, but a penalty moved the ball back to the 8 and set up a pass interception that was the clincher. Pacific held the ball for the final 4:46.

A very entertaining and successful season finale with Montana left the Titans with a 6-6 record against their most difficult schedule ever.

Numerous school records fell as the Titans and Grizzlies engaged in a wild shootout. Ronnie Barber set a single-game total offense mark by passing for a personal high 305 yards and rushing for 33 more. Todd White set a single-season receiving mark as his eight catches brought his season's total to 54. He also returned two punts for 36 yards to become the Titans' single-season and career leader in punt return yardage. Stan Lambert set a personal best with a 51-yard field goal and the Titan defense held the Grizzlies to 9 net rushing yards.

The Grizzlies used a couple of long gadget passes to stay in the game and they even took a lead by taking the second-half kickoff and driving 69 yards in 12 plays for a touchdown.

The Titans went ahead on a Lambert field goal and took control early in the fourth quarter when tackle Jeff Taylor's pass interception set up a 16-yard drive capped by an Eric Franklin scoring plunge.

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the past few seasons. Multiple Titan selections in the annual NFL draft have become the norm with 11 players chosen in the past four years after a total of only three Titans were picked in the previous 14 years.

Last year's choices ranked with the highest ever as tight end Jim Thornton was tabbed by the Chicago Bears on the fourth round and wide receiver Todd White went to the Philadelphia Eagles on round No. 7. Only second-round picks

Daren Gilbert (New Orleans, 1985) and Mark Collins (NY Giants, 1986) rank higher than Thornton, who raised his stock with a stellar performance in the Hula Bowl.

The zenith was reached in 1986 when four Titans were chosen in the first eight rounds. Collins went to the Giants on the second round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the fourth and seventh rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the eighth round.

Actually, the list would have been more impressive had fullback Todd Gerhart and linebacker John Nevens not signed USFL contracts prior to the NFL draft.

Titans have done more than just sign contracts and make rosters. Both Bobby Kemp and Collins hit the jackpot early, playing in the Super Bowl as rookies. Kemp started for the Bengals in a losing cause against San Francisco in 1982 and Collins saw considerable action in a winning effort against the Broncos in January of 1987. The former PCAA Defensive Player of the Year also gained a berth on the NFL All-Rookie team.
