# Dance and Rhythm, A **Cultured Relationship**

Whenever we meet someone new here in Leisure Village, it never seems to be long before we start talking about what ails us and fails us! It was during a "bad back" conversation with a Villager, Lee Ann Elman, that I discovered that she had danced with a renowned ballet company and that her husband John was and still is a very dedicated drummer. But that's not all that there is to tell.

Lee Ann (nee Stevens) was born in Camden, NJ. Her father Don was a very talented computer engineering graduate of M.I.T. As such, Don was much sought after for top jobs by new computer companies. Because of his work, his family moved back and forth from Philadelphia to Los Angeles.

From an early age, Lee Ann had loved the art and discipline of ballet, so when the family lived in Philadelphia, she studied with and then danced for the Pennsylvania Ballet Company. # Water Rate Woes

Camrosa Water District initiated a 5-year rate study, published the study recommendations, held a public meeting and has now approved new rates. The new rates reflect the increased cost of state water supplied through the Metropolitan Water District, repair of Camrosa's aging infrastructure, construction required to meet new State requirements for water and sewer, and the development of new wells to increase our independence from State water suppliers. These new rates started on July 1, 2024. They are increased annually every July. The last of the four increases described below is only four years away and is scheduled for July 1, 2028.


This article covers and explains the cost increases to be implemented over the next 4 years by the Camrosa Water District Board, future articles

will delve into specific limited options for LV to mitigate cost increases decrease our consumption of potable and non-potable water.

Leisure Village is a "master metered" community. We do not have individual water meters for Village homes. Each home is not individually billed for sewer connections. Camrosa creates one monthly bill to the Village for water and sewer, which is much easier for the supplier to manage. The Village Association pays for Camrosa's services though HOA fees. When the rates go up, the HOA fees increase.

The accompanying graph shows the impact of the Camrosa rate increases starting with last fiscal year's budget and the next five years of estimated Camrosa costs starting with the current fiscal year:

## ILLAGE NEWS

Leisure Village Board of Directors - The Annual meeting was held on June 20. Congratulations to the reelected Board Members Marlynn Block and Ruth Stubba.

Paint Project - Woodwork in preparation for painting has started in Village 7, then will move on to Villages 9 and 18.

Roofing Project – Work has started in Village 25.

Concrete - The Village hired an engineer to evaluate the common area concrete infrastructure. The engineer identified and classified cracks and lifted concrete problems as category 3 serious problems, category 2 less serious problems that need to be watched and category 1 cosmetic problems. Subsequently, the Board authorized a new concrete project to address the category 3 and category 2 problems. The project will start in mid-July.

In Ground Garbage Vaults - LV staff are conducting a test program for removing the trash vaults in Village 14. Methods for removing the vaults will be tested and cost/time

data collected. The experience and information collected from the test area will be used to create a plan for removal of all vaults which will be presented to the Board for approval. Water - If you see sprinkler leaks, "geysers" or other irrigation system problems please do not ignore them. Fire up FrontSteps and turn in a work order reporting the details.

Camrosa Flushing Water Lines - Camrosa has been flushing the Village water lines. This may have caused some "brown water" problems which should abate quickly. If you still have problems, call Camrosa directly.

FrontSteps Training Session -FrontSteps is the name of the Village's new community portal software system. A town hall meeting to introduce and provide training on the new FrontSteps system to residents will be held on Thursday, July 25th in the A/R from 10 am to noon. This is a hands-on training session, bring your laptop or smartphone.

Finance – The Village's fiscal year ended on March 31, 2024. End of year unaudited financial statements have been reviewed by the Finance Committee and submitted to the Board. At the May Open Board meeting the services of an auditor were approved. The financial results are being audited, revisions will be made as required by the audit and audited results will be mailed out to homeowners by the end of July. Administration Building Sewers – The Admin building is experiencing serious problems with its sewers and bathrooms which will require major repair. Plans for the repairs have been submitted to the City of Camarillo for permit approval with changes made to their requirements. We are awaiting final approval.

Storm Drains - Negotiations between the Village and the County continue over who is responsible for maintaining the various elements in the storm drain system.

### Don Marquardt's Tree of the Month

### ■ The Blue Jacaranda

BLUE JACARANDA (Jacaranda Mimosifolia). This tree is native to Brazil. In July it explodes with purple blossoms. It is 25-40 feet tall with finely cut fern-like leaves. Flowers grow in 2-inch tubular clusters that bloom from spring through autumn. It is probably one of the most spectacular trees to view, especially at its peak bloom during summer. As a drought tolerant tree, it thrives in warm climates.

There are many Jacarandas currently blooming throughout Leisure Village. One is behind the east parking lot and tennis courts at the #18 green, as well as several along Leisure Village Drive - by Village 17, Village 33 and opposite the Village 35 sign. Enjoy this classic Southern California tree!

For rose lovers - a reminder to fertilize once a month and remove spent flowers every week, to ensure continuous new blooms.



to say thank you. Long story short, Lee Ann and John have been a couple since 1986 and married in 2002.


John was born in Minneapolis, MN. When his father retired from the Postal Service in 1957, the family moved to Van Nuys, CA where they bought a house near where John's sister was teaching. John had started playing drums in elementary school & continued to do so through high school. Even though he was so passionate about playing music, his parents discouraged him from making a career in the music world.


So John put aside any such thought and decided that he would study optometry instead. (It may seem an odd choice for an ardent drummer, but John had two uncles who were ophthalmologists, so that tilted the scales.) He attended L.A. Valley Community College, UC Berkeley & the Southern California College of Optometry from which he earned his Doctorate of Optometry degree. From 1968 to 2023,

he ran his own optometry practice in Santa Monica, ably assisted by Lee Ann. Unfortunately for John, his office was destroyed during the George Floyd protest riots in downtown Santa Monica in May of 2020. A year later he had a stroke and was advised by his doctors to retire and not to drive. By this time, John had had his practice for over 50 years and loved his work so much that he had never taken a sick day and only occasionally a short vacation. So, not unexpectedly, retiring took much readjustment.

John was having increasing difficulty in negotiating the stairs to their second floor apartment. Additionally, their apartment did not qualify for FHA mortgage financing and Malibu was becoming a very expensive place to live. In all, moving elsewhere became an imperative.

Leisure Village was the perfect solution to the Elman's problems. Here John is able to live his child-hood dream of playing the conga drums as he has joined the Groovin' Easy Swing Band and plays every Tuesday in the Assembly Room here. The band members have given

Rodenticides inflict a slow painful death to rodents and other animals. Once eaten, the animal becomes sluggish and debilitated, easy prey for other wildlife, poisoning them as well. A recent study by

the WildCare organization (a non-profit for wildlife protection) found nearly 80% of rodent-consuming wildlife tested positive for secondary rodenticide poisoning. This effect, known as the "toxic food web," is devastating to the surrounding birds and wildlife we wish to protect.

If you or someone you know is putting out poison, the long-term effects are catastrophic to our environment. There are other, more humane means of deterring or eliminating rodents. The animals and many of us in The Village appreciate your attention and cooperation to this issue.

## The Gut and Brain Connection and Your Microbiomes

Researchers have identified a connection between the gut and the brain as the gut is full of nerves and is now sometimes called the second brain. The connection between the gut and brain affects mood, digestion and the way we think. Information is also transmitted from the gut to the immune system affecting mental health and general health. The gut contains microbiomes which are microscopic organisms including bacteria, fungi, viruses and other microbes. In fact, each of us has more DNA from our microbiomes than our own cells in our body. These microbiomes that live with us help digest food, destroy bad bacteria and help control the immune system. It is estimated that 80% of the immune system is within the gut.

There are many ways we can improve gut health. Make sure to effectively digest food by being relaxed when eating, eat slowly, enjoy the taste and chew well, stay away from processed and junk food, drink enough

water to be hydrated, and stay active physically. The key to gut health is to eat the best types of food that can boost gut and mental health. Increase fiber intake as it improves overall memory, mood and fosters a healthy gut and helps the digestive tract to feel better. Go outside to increase vitamin D and eat foods rich in vitamin D (as allowed) such as eggs (especially the yolk), tuna, salmon, oranges and fortified milk. Consume enough lean protein such as nonfat plain Greek vogurt, lean chicken/turkey, fish, broccoli, steel cut oats and nuts. Having foods with Omega-3 fatty acids help lower cholesterol, increase cognition and memory, and reduce sugar cravings. Walnuts, salmon, sardines and flax seeds have Omega-3 fatty acids in them naturally.

Changing the microbiome to be more balanced and healthier can be done by lifestyle changes. Dietary changes also include increasing the consumption of fresh/frozen vegetables, cutting out processed and sugary foods, taking probiotics with live cultures, and avoiding antibiotics whenever possible. Add prebiotics to the dietary intake such as whole grains (not enriched flour products), apples, leeks, onions, garlic, cocoa extract, bananas, nuts, seeds and beans/lentils. Eat some fermented foods such as pickles, kimchi and kefir. Cut back the consumption of beef, especially beef that has been fed antibiotics which is detrimental to the gut. Prioritize sleep as poor sleep increases the risk of disrupting the microbiome balance and increases the risk of developing inflammatory diseases. Staying active physically results in microbiomes being healthier and more diverse. Stress can negatively affect microbiomes and healthy microbiomes are necessary to help manage stress.

Try to eat a rainbow of colors by mixing and eating a variety of plant-based foods with different colors. Eating a Mediterranean diet is linked to a more diverse and balanced microbiome and more positive outcomes. When we have a balanced life, it will support mental and emotional health and optimize gut and overall health.

# A WORD ON WINE

# Wine and Chocolate: Friend or Foe?

Wine and chocolate pairings are very challenging to pull off. Both chocolate and wine have tannins in them, and this is the reason the back of your mouth feels dry after taking a sip of dry red wine or eating a morsel of dark chocolate. But pairing dark chocolate with a tannic red wine is asking for trouble. The tannins in each will clash, making everything taste bitter. However, with a bit of flexibility and delicious experimentation, there are some wine and chocolate pairings that can work.

A good rule of thumb is to pair wine that is slightly sweeter than the chocolate being eaten with it. That said, sweeter doesn't mean more sugar. A wine that's full of ripe fruit flavors can be a good match for chocolate. After all, fruit and chocolate are a classic winning combination.

Many California Red blends evoke flavors of cherry, raspberry and blackberry that can go well with chocolate. Merlot is also a winner, full of sweet, plum notes that are almost chocolate-like. Other dependable pairings are sweeter dessert wines like Quady's Essentia, a fortified orange muscat and Graham's Six Grapes Port.

A good milk chocolate is about half chocolate and half cream-and the extra fat from the cream makes it one of the easiest "true" chocolates to pair with wine. Try pairing it with a sweet wine like Moscato or cream Sherry.

White chocolate is silky, with nutty notes and very sweet. Though not technically chocolate, as it's not made with cocoa, it's still a crowd pleaser. The best white chocolate pairings are made with sweet dessert



wines or a tawny port.

Nevertheless, there will still be folks who want to enjoy their wine separate from their chocolate. Not everything has to go with wine all the time. And certainly, chocolate is one of those things. You can love chocolate, you can love wine, but sometimes you just don't love them together.

Our sewer charges are based on the number of residential, Recreation Center and Administration connections. The current rate is \$43.05 per month per connection. By July 2028 the rate will have increased to \$74.08, a 72% increase in sewer rates. Our annual fiscal year impact in the last year of scheduled increases will be a \$710,506 increase over current rates per year. That is a \$332 increase per residence per year.

Our Meter Charge (really an infrastructure charge) is also based on the number of connections to each building in the Village. There are 2136 homes and 25 Admin. Buildings. We pay a "master metered" reduced rate compared to the individual homeowners with meters served by Camrosa. The current rate is \$6.56 per month per connection. By July 2028 the rate will have increased to \$10.29, a 37% increase in water meter rates. Our annual fiscal year impact in the last year will be a \$83,050 increase per year. That is \$39 more per residence per year.

Our Household (Potable) water Our annual fiscal year impact in the —Please see PAGE 14

is charged by our usage in hundred cubic feet (HCF) units. We use about 100,000 HCF per year. The current rate is \$4.01 per HCF. By July 2028 the rate will have increased to \$5.26, a 31% increase in household water rates.

# ART IN THE VILLAGE

## From Cab Driver to Carnegie

David Singer is a world renowned, Grammy winning clarinet player, but along the way he also worked as a cabbie in New York City and sold welding rods in Seattle. He recently wrote a book detailing highlights of his journey, "From Cab Driver to Carnegie Hall."

A Leisure Village resident for the past 12 years with his wife Barb and various pets, Singer's musical journey began in Canoga Park.

"I was interested in baseball and I was interested in girls, not necessarily in that order," he said. When he was about 10, a girl he had a crush on entered a talent show so he decided to enter too. His father was the band director at Canoga Park High School and asked David what he planned to do. He had brought home various instruments for his son to try.

The cello and violin were challenging, he said.

"I couldn't buzz my lips on the

trumpet but the clarinet just seemed to fit."

His dad taught him the song, "Long, Long Ago."

"I learned the song and entered the show and beat the girl and she had less to do with me than before," he said. But he continued with the clarinet.

In 1962, when Singer was 12, his dad took a year sabbatical and the family went to Europe where his parents were from. In Austria, he was introduced to Rudolf Jettel, the principal clarinetist of the Vienna Philharmonic, who took him on as a student. Jettel invited Singer to turn pages for him during the opera season performance.

"It couldn't have been any more eventful than if I had been the batbov for the LA Dodgers," he said. "You were at the top of the top of the music mecca. Hearing the singers, the emotion, I just fell in love with expressing feelings through music. That was the

experience that really changed my life."


He was offered a scholarship to stay but went back home with his parents and continued his study of the clarinet, going back to Vienna in his early 20s and resuming his study with Jettel. In his late 20s he was a soloist in the Orpheus Ensemble in the music hall in Vienna where he had turned pages for Jettel. "This

time I was a soloist and Jettel was an old man in the audience," he said.

"Nothing was easy for me," Singer said, describing his journey. He went to Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia where there was only a three percent acceptance rate.

"It's free but you are practicing all day long," he said. He missed

California, the beach and baseball and hated gloomy Philadelphia. One day he was practicing when the fire marshall pounded on the door evacuating everyone. He left his clarinet on the floor and went to a friend's house. All day long sirens blared and the fire burned.

"I said to my friend, if the place burns, that's God telling me I should be doing something else.

I went back and the whole other side of the street was burned. I walked in, there was my clarinet, nothing changed."

He was invited to perform with the Marlboro Music Festival by famed pianist Rudolf Serkin, who chose Singer to record with him.

"I started to have success," he said. "When I started playing with Orpheus, members didn't get paid. That's the story of a musician, you do anything to be heard. Soon after I joined I got an opportunity to substitute at Carnegie Hall."

To supplement his income and support his daughter he drove a taxi



in New York City.

"I played for President Carter while with Marlboro and went back to New York the same day to drive my cab," he said. He played for the Clintons with the Lincoln Center Chamber Music Society at one of the last parties before Clinton left office.

In Seattle he sold welding rods to supplement his income, sometimes fending off guard dogs at the shops he sold to.

He was professor of clarinet at

Montclair State University in New Jersey for 23 years and awarded emeritus status in 2012.

Singer was principal clarinetist of the Grammy Award winning Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and the New York Chamber Symphony, performing around the world. He won two Grammys and has appeared on over 100 recordings. Top names he has performed with include Serkin, Yehudi Menuhin, Yo-Yo Ma and Pinchas Zukerman. He co-starred with Stockard Channing in the play, "The Lady and the Clarinet," performing the entire musical score unaccompanied.

There is not enough room to list all the groups Singer has played with, the venues he has performed at and the awards he has won. A New York Times review called him "an exceptionally gifted clarinetist."

Here in Camarillo he continues to teach through local schools and privately. In addition, he does charitable performances whenever he can, a mitzvah, he said.

Singer wrote the book in part to deliver a positive message about overcoming challenges. It is available through Amazon and Barnes and Noble.

last year will be a \$102,270 increase per year. That is \$48 more per residence per year.

The one bit of good news is that irrigation (non-potable) water rates will not change over the five years. Since we use over 300,000 HCF of irrigation water, this is a major savings since the Village expected year-overyear rate increases. The total cost increase of all Camrosa charges is \$852,000 per year – four fiscal years from now. That is a \$400 increase per year per residence (\$33.25 per month).

We can use conservation to reduce the household water increase. We can reduce our irrigation water usage to save money. Sewer and water meter charges are flat rates and not subject to conservation on the Village's part.

The new water rates are coming. There will be an impact on future HOA rates.
