

EPORT report to the democratic state central committee by charles warren, state chairman. august 11, 1968 sacramento, california

In two weeks, Democrats will assemble in Chicago to nominate candidates for President and Vice President. In California we have already selected our candidates for the United States Senate, Congress and the State Legislature. With the close of the national convention we will begin a campaign which will be one of the more important and significant in our state and nation's history.

California will be a pivotal state in this year's campaign. What kind of man will it send to the United States Senate? Will present congressional and legislative Democratic majorities be maintained? Will the selection of a President be referred to the House of Representatives and, if so, will the one vote allowed California be decided by a Democratic or Republican congressional delegation majority?

These are but a few of the many questions which only the election itself can answer. To a limited extent the California Democratic State Central Committee can influence those answers; to that limited extent, yours will be the responsibility. Further, it will be your responsibility to look ahead to 1970 and to do all you can to win back the many posts in government we lost in 1966. With this in mind, you will appreciate the nature and extent of the work ahead of you.

We have tried to furnish you with a foundation upon which to build. We have had some successes and some failures. Our successes have come about by the energy and devotion of a few good people; our failures await your efforts.

In the beginning, we recognized three major problems confronting our Party as a result of political erosion prior to 1966, and the resultant landslide defeat of that year.

First, organizationally we were weak, if not impotent. Our state and county central committees appeared to be only anachronisms and useless appendages. Our volunteer organizations were rapidly atrophying.

Second, ideologically, even our fractures were splintering. What was even more disturbing, we seemed to be losing our ability to communicate. In a word, we were no longer able to disagree without being disagreeable.

Third, financially we were bankrupt. Coupled with our deficit was the fact that most who had the means financially to build the party became unwilling to do so. The "quid pro quo" of political contribution no longer appeared promising.

It would be pleasant to report that all these problems have been solved. Far from it; but we do believe a beginning has been made and it is that beginning which I want to report. DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN COMMITTEES

In an attempt to bring together volunteer and official party organizations to perform basic and vital political work, Legislative Campaign Committees were formed in thirty-nine geopolitical regions of the state.

In each region, incumbent officeholders, all resident members of state and county central committees, and officers and leaders of all volunteer organizations were asked to meet under the sponsorship of the Democratic State Central Committee. At each meeting the problems of our Party, both regional and state, were discussed and the possibilities of collective action explored.

At most meetings, there was recognition of the need for unified and coordinated activity and acceptance of the concept of a Democratic Campaign Committee. These Democratic Campaign Committees have been most helpful. Hopefully they will not only be continued, but expanded and encouraged to assume more responsible and significant work.

DEMOCRATIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE



Recognizing the ideological strains which existed among all Democrats, and not just among those in California, the Democratic Advisory Committee was formed. It was designed to recruit the talents of men and women of experience and expertise in various endeavors to stimulate thought, discussion and debate among all Democrats in a rational and non-divisive manner.

The committee formed various task forces and prepared tentative position papers which were used as the basis for discussion at seminars held at the Fresno conference in January, 1968.

Following the seminar discussions at Fresno, the task forces prepared final papers which have been printed and distributed to all members of the State Central Committee and to members of the Platform Committee of the State Convention.

These papers have not been represented to be nor are they the official views of the California Democratic Party. They are offered to help identify some of the critical problem areas of state and local concern and to propose possible means for their solution.

FRESNO DEMOCRATIC CONFERENCE



In January of this year the Democratic State Central Committee sponsored a conference of Democrats in Fresno, California. The conference had as its objectives:

- (a) To assemble all individuals participating in a leadership capacity in the various Democratic Campaign Committees for the purpose of discussing common problems and coordinating regional efforts on a state-wide basis.
- (b) To bring together task force members of the Democratic Advisory Committee and all interested Democrats for the purpose of discussing preliminary drafts of the task force reports and making possible the presentation and consideration of new ideas and fresh thought.
- (c) To acquaint active and concerned Democrats with those who occupy leadership positions in all levels of government to the end that some or all might be encouraged to seek new levels of leadership in future election years.
- (d) To expose members of our Party to the thoughts and comments of national leaders on the national and international problems confronting our nation.

Accepting the invitation of the Democratic State Central Committee to attend and address the conference were Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and United States Senator Eugene McCarthy. Ours was the first official party organization to invite and provide a forum to both of these good Democrats and great public servants.

All who attended the conference were impressed with its success. By it a new tradition and role were established for the Democratic State Central Committee.

CAMPUS VISITATION PROGRAM (



Recognizing the validity of the complaint of alienation by many young people and seeking to bring to them those who could "tell how it is," the Democratic State Central Committee asked Democratic freshmen members of the Assembly to organize a campus visitation program.

REPORT

The legislators met with students on many campuses in residence halls, classrooms, dining rooms and wherever students could be found who were interested in learning more of politics and government.

The results of this program are exciting and promising. A current and productive dialogue between students and Democratic office holders has been established.

JEFFERSON-JACKSON DAY DINNER



Mayor Carl Stokes of Cleveland was the honored guest at a Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner held at the Century Plaza Hotel in March, 1968. Sponsored by the Century Club and Finance Committee of the Democratic State Central Committee, the event brought to California for the first time the vigorous and exciting young Cleveland Mayor.

A financial success, the dinner enabled the Democratic State Central Committee to eliminate its deficit and to continue its operations on a solvent basis.

MONTE CORONA CANDIDATES SEMINAR



On the weekend of July 13-14, 1968, the Democratic State Central Committee sponsored a seminar for candidates, their spouses and campaign aides. Held at the beautifully secluded Monte Corona Conference Center near Lake Arrowhead, California, the seminar offered instruction and guidance in the art of both old and new political techniques. Closed circuit TV permitted playbacks and critical analyses of candidate interviews. Wives of candidates were given suggestions on how they could assist their husbands. Experienced newsmen discussed conducting press conferences and drafting newsworthy press releases. The value of computer mailing and polling was described. In sum, eighteen different panel programs were held, each worthwhile and all invaluable.

WOMEN'S DIVISION



In all metropolitan areas, the Women's Division sponsored events to honor and award pins to "Key Democratic Women" in the 1966 campaign. Workshops were held to advise active women Democrats of legislation deserving either their opposition or support.

Local Women's Division chapters were among our most active volunteer organizations and their members participated in and contributed to all activities of the Democratic State Central Committee.

GENERAL ACTIVITY



In 1967, an office of the Democratic State Central Committee was established in Sacramento in addition to those in Los Angeles and San Francisco. Maintained during the legislative session of that year, it helped to focus public attention on the deleterious consequences of the Republican administration's policies.

Our newspaper, "The California Democrat", was published and distributed to over twenty thousand readers throughout the State.

Our office staff has been available to service all requests from the public and political organizations. Our press and public relations personnel worked with visiting dignitaries arranging press and television interviews giving exposure to Democratic personalities and programs.

A Speakers Bureau functioned well responding to many invitations from news media, service and other organizations for spokesmen to delineate and debate topical issues and to articulate the viewpoints of the Democratic Party.

CENTURY CLUB (



The Century Club was formed by the Democratic State Central Committee to expand its base of financial support. There appeared to be no place for the committed individuals who, able to afford the annual dues of one hundred dollars, sought also to donate their time, energy and talent. It was this gap the Century Club was designed to fill. Meeting frequently to host visiting dignitaries, participating in the deliberations of the Democratic Advisory Committee, assisting the Finance Committee on the Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner and in many other activities, the Century Club proved itself most worth-while.

"SINCE 1792 --- THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY"



Under the auspices of the Democratic State Central Committee, the book entitled "Since 1792 --- The Democratic Party" was authored. Published by the Democratic State Central Committee in association with MBM Enterprises, the book has a retail price of \$10. Candidates and Democratic organizations may buy the book at the wholesale price of \$2 per copy. The book may then be sold to a buyer for the retail price. The buyer may in turn donate copies of the book to libraries, classrooms, schools and other tax exempt institutions and use the \$10 retail price as a tax exempt contribution.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CANDIDATES



During the 1966 general campaign, it became obvious that some of our candidates for Congress and the state legislature were in jeopardy. To give immediate financial assistance, the Democratic State Central Committee Finance Committee and Century Club borrowed and distributed over twenty thousand dollars to candidates in high priority districts. Most candidates receiving assistance won election or re-election. All loans have been repaid.

THE CALIFORNIA GOOD CITIZEN COMMITTEE



The Democratic State Central Committee in association with the Republican State Central Committee, labored throughout the last two years to develop and expand the program of the California Good Citizenship Committee.

This committee was organized to stimulate interest in, and to provide the means for, company employees to become informed on the issues and conditions involved in federal, state and local elections, to encourage and assist in the registration of company employees as potential voters in such elections; and to promote and facilitate personal contributions by company employees to the political party or candidate of their choice.

At present there are over seventy companies in California who have agreed to participate in this program and to involve their employees in one or all of its activities during the coming campaign year.

The Democratic State Central Committee gratefully acknowledges the dedication and assistance of those who labored so generously on its behalf during the past two years. Some who participated above and beyond are named below. To them and the host of others who persevered, we extend our thanks and appreciation.


