




## Foreword ...



To the Graduating Class of 1954






"Doctor" Arndt, as he was commonly referred to, arrived at C.M.A. after a year at the University of California and a short stint in the Merchant Marine.



Coming to C.M.A. as a novice tennis player he has developed into one of the finest the school has ever produced.



While he was aboard, his time and effort were spent in the most industrious pursuits—either writing a letter to or reading a letter from his fiancee, Chervl.



John was one of the more fortunate fellows here. He found a home at C.M.A. and had only a few miles to go to remind himself of the fact.




become a master some day.

Ken has been outstanding in athletics throughout his three years at the Academy. He was more than just another player, for he excelled in softball, basketball, and water polo.


His never-ending grind to keep the canteen running smoothly and his many other varied activities gave him the name of "Activities."


On August 29, 1951, Elzy, the "Tulare Kid," came walking down "Academy Road," leaving the warm valley for C.M.A. by the sea.


On cruise, Don was the very able head of the "Snow White Laundry." Except for lost, torn, or yellow clothes there were no complaints from the corps.




After watching ships of all types plying up and down the coast of California from his grandstand seat in Carpinteria for years, it was only natural that Jerry chose C.M.A.







His escapades around the Bay Area are matched only by his last-night-ashore experiences on cruise.


