In the June issue of I.L.V. outgoing board member, Bob Chass, contributed an excellent article giving all the details and results of the recent Village-wide termite inspection. The situation appeared grim indeed. Termites and abundant wood rot fungus were found and it was thoroughly depressing news. Each homeowner realized that we have a real problem, if not now, very possibly in the future.

ILV now intends a follow-up on what can be done. As so often happens in L.V., we have an expert in our large talentpool of residents, who was recommended by the Arch. Comm. (of which he is a member) to give prac-



Editorial

Two very important but controversial questions, after heated arguments, have been voted down within the last several months. Just now they are at an impasse but they are not going away; they will have to be approached again. (Please see Harry Becker's article on page 3.

In the very near future this is not likely to happen. Summer is a time of vacation, many people are away or are busy with visitors. There is a new Board, perhaps it will have some new or different ideas to

help solve the problems.

For those of us who are free, this interval can be utilized by familiarizing ourselves with how the business of the Village is really conducted. We urge you to explore as many facets of Village life as you can. How do the dedicated volunteers who make up the committees and Board make their decisions? Sit in on the board meeting of any of the clubs in the Village. Come to an ILV planning meeting. Although we have no official standing in L.V. we are concerned with its well-being. (Call an editor for place and time). Most important of all, attend monthly Board of Directors meetings and audit at least once the Finance, Security and Architectural and Bldg. & Grnds. Committees.

Communication is always a problem. Relatively few people are actively aware of what really makes the wheels go around in the city, county or country or world in which they live. Perhaps that is too big a task to expect, but in our own corner, L.V., it shouldn't be impossible. When it comes time to mark a ballot many people become aware that they are not really cognizant of the situation and therefore rely upon someone else's opinion to influence their votes, or worse still, shut their eyes and guess — or not vote at all!

We shall never know how many people at last month's Town Hall meeting changed their votes after more alert people had pointed out discrepancies in the wording of the issue. Concise, understandable statements that are specific and complete are a must in legal documents. We have not always had this. Changes that only contribute to the confusion are worse than none — we must guard against them.

On the other hand we must remember that the life blood of democracy is difference of opinion which fosters thoughtful debate and eventual compromise. Such a system of checks and balances is not efficient in terms of time and sometimes not in money, but anything else is dictatorship and therefore unthinkable to a democratic society.

New LV Directors Face Critical Decisions

Resident-owners of Leisure Village are indeed fortunate to have had persons of high quality serving on the Board of Directors. The three newly-elected members, Art Wilson, Mike Sherman and Tom O'Brien, provide an unusual amount of professionalism and experience based on active participation in Village government. Together with Jack Rogers and Joe Selber now serving their second year, they will be tackling the job of governing our Village. Inside Leisure Village wishes them well and will try to be constructive in its coverage.

Our Village Constitution, the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions, usually referred to as the CC&Rs, is over fifteen years old. A continuous process of deterioration affects us all, villagers and Village alike. We are all too familiar with the personal problems of aging. We have learned that in the last analysis we are responsible for maintaining our health. We have learned to get second medical opinions, to keep abreast of on-going research, new diagnostic tools, new medications and new approaches to nutrition.

So it is with our aging, changing, growing Village. We must cope with the deterioration of our structures and our infrastructure and we must meet the challenges of inevitably rising costs with an annual budget approaching four million dollars. The attention of all villagers is required to deal with the problems. The Association Committee structure is the means to help the Board govern more effectively. The Board will be better able to tackle the formidable task of solving problems if villagers participate in the decision-making process and cooperate effectively by enlightened voting. Now is the time to volunteer to serve on committees.

We are constantly involved in the logistics of getting enough votes legally required to pass certain measures. Three quarters of the residents are needed to approve most CC&R changes and additions. An added complication is the fact that no absentee ballots are allowed at the annual meeting.

Problems requiring immediate consideration include the unfinished business of the July 1987 Annual Meeting. The annual budget has been established and funding has been voted. We are now to be confronted with an enormous addition in sewer charges, plus a rise in water costs of \$6.50 a month per home. This was recently announced in the press. For two thousand homes — and we have more — the water costs alone would increase our annual budget by \$156,000!

We can appreciate the enormity of the task confronting all of us. Maintaining the high quality of life in Leisure Village is challenging. Participating in the grass roots, old-fashioned township-type of democracy can be exhilarating. It is an opportunity and a privilege.

Unfinished Business

Last month's election of three Board members -Tom O'Brien and Mike Sherman, former Association presidents, together with Art Wilson - promises to usher in a fresh breeze in the conduct of Village affairs.

Facing the new Board of Directors is an Agenda of Unfinished Business. Here is a partial list:

- 1) Resolving the dispute centered on the insurance deductible
- 2) Where to get the money for needed capital improvements
- 3) How to restore greater attendance by villagers at public meetings of the Board and of the Associa-

The Insurance Debate

Ever since 1985, the Board has refused to pay villagers' claims arising under the \$1,000 deductible provision of the fire insurance policy, upset-

procedure originally started by the builder. Leisure Technology Corporation. The present policy went requirement for passage. into effect without public discussion or even a public announcement, until a storm of protest arose.

The controversy has dragged on for more than two years. A referendum vote to validate the practice of non-payment, by amending the CC&Rs, was decisively defeated last year by a vote of 1148 to 410. On the other hand, an attempt to amend the CC&Rs this year, to spell out the Board's responsibility to pay the deductible, failed to achieve the required 75% vote.

Nevertheless, it is important to note that a marjority of ballots in both referenda favored the return to the 11-year practice of paying the deductible. But even if all the 1382 votes cast in the

ting a long-established 1987 insurance referendum had been counted in the affirmative, that would still not have met the 75%

> The new Board, two of whose members served on the Ad Hoc Committee to Restore Insurance Integrity, has an opportunity to solve the dilemma.

> > Proposition A

The rationale behind the proposal to utilize some of the funds set aside as security for payment of the monthly fees, which experience has shown are not entirely needed for that purpose, is to fund certain capital improvements without raising the annual assessments.

According to the CC&Rs, only a majority vote is required to authorize the fund transfer, but it appears that the vote fell short by a margin of 339. If we were to specu-



Walls will be ready for paint but not painted, doors will be hung but not finished; no floor coverings or counter tops are included.

> One room will be dedicated to a Ch. 12 studio, giving both the planning and technical sub-committees much needed room. They have been operating out of a small room (read closet) off the AR. The second new room will be for general group meetings and will seat 40-50.

> Russ Sievert and his Ch. 12 research and development committee hope that beige carpeting, lighter beige acoustical

fabric wall covering, white ceiling and walnut-grain Formica counter tops can be installed in the Ch. 12 studio during August. The new room has double doors so that TV cameras and sound equipment can be moved in and out for taping of Village events. Specialized equipment desired by Ch. 12 must await later funding.

Other projects recently completed, according to George Thomas, recreation facilities manager, are installation of the new swimming pool chemical injection system, operation of which was inspected by the Health Dept.; pool fencing, both wooden and wrought iron, repaired or replaced; the assessment box for monthly homeowners' checks rebuilt and hung on the wall in the hall opposite the Library.

Additional projects under consideration by the Board are a chemical injection system for the spa, resurfacing of the high traffic cement areas near the pool and spa with a non-skid material, and a wind screen for the exercise and ping pong area south of the pool, similar to the screen used for the tennis courts.

Camarillo Health Care District is a public entity, whose primary goal is to provide quality health related services to the citizens residing in and around the city of Camarillo. Two of the services offered by the district are Lifeline and the Adult Day Center.

Lifeline is a personal emergency alarm and response system. It is designed to help medically vulnerable or physically impaired people live at home with confidence and independence. Subscribers wear "personal help buttons." In an emergency, the subscriber presses the "personal help but-ton," which alerts the Lifeline Emergency Response Center located at Pleasant Valley Hospital. Specially trained personnel at the Hospital react to the alarm by dispatching appropriate assistance to

the subscriber's home.

The Adult Day Center is a program which provides care and services to frail homebound older adults who are no longer able to attend other senior programs. Participants are given the opportunity for social contact and intellectual stimulation in a program of activities designed to meet their special needs and limitations. The Day Center offers relief for caregivers from the daily responsibilities of caring for a frail adult and prevents premature placement in a long term care facility.



Installation of L.V.'s System Recalled By Resident

"Last month's story of the history of our television system and reasons for occasional failures brought back a flood of memories," said Ben Drasin, a Village 13 resident whose involvement with this system goes back to 1972.

Ben and his wife Evelyn were Woodland Hills residents in those days but he was employed here as Director of Purchasing for the developer, Leisure Technology.

"Our studies for an adequate TV system started in 1972," says Ben. "There were many problems to be faced, chief among them the fact that we are in a 'hole' here and a direct TV signal cannot reach us."

Two choices were available, he explained. One was to own our own system and the other to use

the commercial company, Storer Cable.

"The Storer system at that time was neither fully satisfactory nor inexpensive," he stated. "Further, there was no guarantee against future escalation of costs."

"We decided to lease land from Prudential, high on a hill, about two miles from here. A 300' high antenna was installed and to protect the installation, we later purchased the land."

With this antenna, it would now be possible to catch the very high frequencies (VHF) and ultra high frequencies (UHF) from both Los Angeles and Santa Barbara stations.

Two operations now faced the planners. First, a tap had to be made from the Southern California Edison line running along the bottom of the hill. That power line reached the antenna and



now, in order to get a picture and sound to Leisure Village, an underground cable, some two miles long, had to be laid, reaching the recreation building.

"We hired the most such a great job that soon knowledgeable man in the after people started mov-

business at that time," said Ben. "Capp Loughboro from Ventura was our choice. You must remember that the state of the art was not good at this time but Capp did such a great job that soon after people started move-

ing into the first Village, #11, the system was operational."

As the years rolled on, and as more homes were built, the television problems mounted. The underground vaults, holding the TV connection, occasionally flooded. This not only caused the television picture to fade, but called for equipment replacements.

"This was largely solved," says Ben with a smile, "by installing an above-the-ground pedestal connector box. You'll recognize it as that green inverted cone in the lawn near the front of most homes."

"Still," he continues, "there were problems. We had lots of interference on the low bands. We hired Western Cable Services to solve the problem and they reported that the leakage was due to low electrical impulse. This was a frustrating period for us but we were finally able to convince So. Calif. Edison that the problem was theirs. In time they did improve service.'

How does he view the future so far as our TV system goes?

'There will continue to be occasional problems,' he reports. "The forces of nature, heavy and unexpected loads on the power company, possible vandalism at our tower and equipment malfunctions all pose possible disruptions. However. Communications Services is quick to respond these days and we look for hours upon hours of pleasant television viewing."

Profile: Ike And Sonia Abrams

If one sentence might epitomize this month's Profile couple, it could well be: Yesterday, today, and yes, even tomorrow, the world of Ike and Sonia Abrams accentuates youth involvement.

Our Village 38 residents were born in Philadelphia and first met on the campus of Temple University. Ike was an outstanding featherweight boxer, undefeated in Golden Glove and college boxing bouts and narrowly missed winning the Intercollegiate Championship Title fight.

The young couple continued dating after graduation. Sonia taught stenography and typing at evening school while lke worked as an accountant for the U.S. government.

They married in August 1941 and four months later our country was at war. Within weeks lke entered aviation cadet training, graduated as a navigator and was soon in combat in Foggia, Italy.

As a member of the 301st Bomb Group, his B-17 Squadron flew 50 combat missions, bombing major German cities plus Austria, Romania and the always dangerous Ploesti oil fields. Among his many medals is the Distinguished Flying Cross

At the close of the European conflict he returned to the U.S. to set up educational programs for combat returnees. In the closing months of the war he was Air Inspector at Scott Field in Illinois.

Then it was back to Philadelphia to become joint owner of a super market. The lure of education caught him and in 1950 he sold his business and started teaching at Lincoln H.S. In addition to the business and accounting classes, he was golf coach and his teams won



the city championship she joined him, teaching three times in four years. He also continued in the Air Force Reserve.

a teacher, took time out in 1946 for the birth of their daughter, Barbara Susan. Later, with Ike at Lincoln,

typing and shorthand.

In the early 1960's Ike went to Olney High Sonia, also working as School as vice principal, with discipline and gang control his major responsibility.

"There were fourteen

different black gangs at the school," says lke. "It was not easy getting them to cooperate, but working closely with the gang leaders, I was able to prevent what, in some cases, could have become full-scale riots.'

In the years that followed lke was asked to speak before several hundred civic groups, stressing how constructive efforts could control protests, vandalism and major disturbances.

The year 1971 found him back at Lincoln High School, this time as V.P. in charge of discipline, and three years later became principal for an alternative school.


"In 1978 we had a return visit by Silvester Stallone," says lke. He had been a student at Lincoln in 1962 and was asked to leave due to poor attendance. Seems he only wanted to make the classes in English and Drama."

"This time, however, he brought the filming crew that was currently making 'Rocky II' and they shot several scenes on campus. Sonia and I had a number of good laughs with him, recalling his earlier days at school.'

Both worked at Lincoln HS until their retirement in 1979 with Sonia being designated top commercial teacher in the district.

Their retirement testimonial dinner was attended by hundreds of teachers, business leaders and school graduates. Tributes poured in, including one from the Superintendent of the Philadelphia School District. One letter they especially cherish, that from a former problem student, today a high ranking official with the Office of Postmaster General, states in part: Your influence will multiply through our children and their children as we pass along the ideals you have taught us with both words and deeds May God be

Buildings And Grounds Committee

The Village is looking particularly good these days and we are working to make it look even better. Most people have cleaned up outside their fences and around the trees. Many people have found other ways to beautify their units. We are seeing better plantings on top the fences and attention is being given to the appearance of each unit.

Many who have redstaked areas are not maintaining them. If you are no longer able to maintain your red-staked area, why not have it cleaned up and turn the maintenance back to the Village crew.

Camrosa has raised its water rates by 12.5 percent. This means that all means must be found to keep the water bill down. Rationing is being mentioned in some areas. The Landscape/Maintenance Dept. is trying many ways to keep the water bill down and to water to a minimum. Planting beds get watered but once a week. This may not be enough for your little plants but it is sufficient for the shrubs. You may have to water by hand, but don't waste water. All residents should report any excessive watering. If your area is brown, report it on a green sheet. Don't hand water for that doesn't help when the fault is a problem with the sprinklers.

The spray which is being used around the trees and for edging the planter beds is a systemic spray and may cause damage to vegetables. This spray stays in the ground and can cause problems if it is taken up by the vegeta-



quirements of the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency of three feet (3') of levee freeboard above a theoretical 100-year flood elevation, we were initially advised by the City of Camarillo that one location of relatively short length on our levee was 6" to 8" deficient. As Pardee's developments contributed to this problem, the City advised he would be required to raise the berm to the proper elevation. On or about Aug. 26, 1986, Pardee installed approximately 600 tons of material on the levee over a distance of about 700'.

We received a new Federal Insurance Rate Map from the City about October 11, 1986, and much to our surprise and dismay, it indicated about two-thirds of the Village was below the projected 100-year flood elevation. We had been led to believe that all slabs in the Village were above the required elevation and that the levee improvement work stated above met the new requirements. As this map is used by all insurance companies to determine rates. our premium was substantially increased for the same coverage. The Board of Directors approved our recommendation to retain an engineering consulting firm to investigate the presumed irregularities.

We met with Woodyard & Associates, our consultants on October 28, 1986 and thoroughly discussed the situation. Their subsequent investigations revealed that improper benchmark elevations were used in a previous study and therefore levee elevations were incorrect.

On Feb. 10, 1987, a meeting was held at the office of the Ventura Flood Control District attended by representatives from that office, City of Camarillo, engineering consultants and Leisure Village. It was decided that Pardee would do

tical advice on what to do as of right now.

This knowledgeable person is Dan Davis of Village 31, a California licensed general contractor with approximately 40 years in the industry working at several trades including architectural drafting. He was the sole owner of Dan Davis Development Co. and the holder of other related California State licenses.

In 1968 he changed his operation from the building of tract homes to custom new homes and remodel work. It was at that time while working with older structures that he gained first hand experience with termite damage problems.

Dan, now a member of the Arch./Landscape Comm., has prepared approximately 20 sets of working drawings for the Village. Some of these projects are completed, some are presently under construction and some are in the planning stage.

ILV will be relaying his advice to you in a series of interviews. This first one is concerning things that can be done right now.

No. 1: don't panic! There is plenty that can be done without great expense, much of it by homeowners themselves.

There are several things to keep in mind. First, the real use of termite inspection is to obtain certification when a home is being sold. Second, each of our homes is on a cement slab, is only one-story high and has asphalt shingle roofing. These pluses, as well as the knowledge that termites seldom invade plaster walls, give us time to do what repairs prove necessary only after a full study of the problem. Our homes will not come down around our ears.

Remember that the average professional exterminator company will treat

damage but will not be able to repair.

One of the first things each of us should do is look around our homes ourselves (even if a clean bill of health was given). Termites like to be around dampness. Mr. Davis points out that any leak can set up a potential termite colony. Check under all sinks, bathroom fixtures, leaky faucets, washing machines, etc. The habit many homeowners have of using plastic shelf lining under sinks or shelves harbors dampness. Never cover any vent hole. Outside the house, see that trees and bushes do not touch the building. Leave air space. The habit of keeping potted or boxed plants on top of fences also creates dampness. Watch for any suspiciously spongy wood. Mr. Davis remarked that the Beverly Hills area has a serious infestation problem simply because their grounds and gardens are too well watered by the gardeners.



Religion And **Holistic Medicine**

There are many different definitions of religion and each one can be valid. Here is my definition.

Religion is the reaching out of one's whole being mind, body, spirit, emotions, intuitions and affections - for completion, for inner unity, for a true relationship with those about us, for a right relationship to the universe in which we live. Religion is life, a certain kind of life, life as it should and could be, a life of harmony within and true adjustment without.

Religion is also a hunger for beauty and love and glory. It is wonder and awe, mystery and majesty, passion and ecstacy. It is emotion as well as mind, feeling as well as knowing. It is the heart soaring to heights that the head alone will never know; the understanding

of meanings that science alone will never find: the awareness of values that ethics alone will never reveal. It is the human spirit yearning for, and finding, something infinitely greater than itself which it calls faith. And the essence of all faith is that man's life can be and will be better. that man's greatest enemies, in the forms in which they now exist the forms we see on every hand, of fear, of hatred, slavery, cruelty, poverty and suffering can be conquered and destroyed. In the affirmation of this fact, the building of a better world is man's religion and his living faith.

Not long ago, the idea of focusing on the mind, spirit and body in a totalperson approach to health care was regarded as so much hocus-pocus by most of the medical establishment.

That is no longer the case. More health professionals have come around to believing that a healthcare approach which inte-

grates the physical, emotional and even the spiritual is perfectly valid.

Dr. Rudolph Ballentine, a psychiatrist who is a firm believer in what's known as the holistic medicine concept is optimistic about the medical profession's acceptance of this new approach to health care.

Holistic medicine has been defined in many ways with emphasis on treating a person in the context of his whole life that what goes on in his body relates to his mind, and vice-versa. In such an approach, maintaining and improving health is as important as curing disease. Dr. Ballentine feels that public and health professionals are gradually accepting holistic medicine because no one can afford the high cost of illness anymore.

A lot of scientific research has shown that a person's emotions and personality are closely



Dr. John Knowles, president of the Rockefeller Foundation, has said that more than 99% of us are born healthy and made sick as a result of personal misbehavior and environmental conditions.

Dr. Ballentine's view of a holistic health program is one that aims at not only improving the symptoms of the disease from which a person is suffering, but which contributes to his overall growth so he can evolve into a more creative and dynamic person. He emphasizes that holistic medicine does not exclude conventional well-being, according to answer to the mainte- body, mind and spirit.

> Meditation and relaxation techniques including biofeedback, exercise, nutrition and diet are important elements in the holistic approach.

Dr. Ballentine believes that some doctors prefer to give a patient a drug like cortisone for an illness because it produces rapid and dramatic results. That approach takes less time than finding out what's causing a person's health problem and then helping him relax or to change his diet. He concludes that the medical profession is now ready to embrace a different approach aimed medicine such as surgery. at preventing disease tied in with his physical But surgery is only one through a balance of



Reporters and publicity people submitting material to be used in Inside Leisure Village will help out the staff greatly (and may enhance the reception of their material!) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

- 1. Type all material, or we must take time to type it, a delay. Submit hand-written copy early.
- 2. Use full size 8 x 11 sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
- 3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS; stories in all caps must be retyped.
- 4. Put writer's name and phone number in upper left corner.
- 5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our notation.
- 6. Type group's name and writer's name.
- 7. Double space each line and indent each paragraph. (If we sound like English teachers, you're right!)
- 8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence. This makes it easier to match up with the right logo.
- 9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red ribbons or xerox copies, please. Clean copy prevents misunderstandings.
- 10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is Monday noon, usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact dates and meet them.
- 11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator and tell her when you can get it in and why it must be late. Coordinator has the option to accept or refuse late copy.
- 12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Please do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

There are about 75 items submitted to ILV for each issue. If writers used these standard rules, our job is made easier.


