Dirk Feild is a man of many parts, each and every one of them a subject for an interesting and enlightening conversation. Thus it has been a challenge for me to write an approximately 800 word profile & not a full biography.

Dirk was born in the Oakland area of California, but his family soon moved to Florida because that was where his father got a job in the field of Ground Control Approach Radar. That was just the first of many moves for the family all over the U.S.

Because of his own passion for scuba diving, Dirk's father couldn't wait to share that love with his two children. So at the age of 6, Dirk was almost the youngest scuba diver in the U.S. He was shut out of that distinction by his 4 year old sister!

For some time, Dirk & his father were professional scuba divers & sunken treasure hunters, working in areas such as the Bermuda Triangle.

Their finds included pieces of eight, golden doubloons and cannon balls – oh, & then there were the 15 sunken ships from 1614 & 1715 fleets with cargoes of gold. Unfortunately, severe bouts of asthma meant that a different career path would be wise.

Dirk enrolled at UCLA with the intention of majoring in Math, but then decided to try Physics, then moved back to Math. In that era, there were no majors in Computer Science, so Dirk completed a Master's degree in a combination of Math & Computer Science. He completed his studies for a PhD in AI & Computational Complexity, but did not give a dissertation. The reason for not doing so was that, at the end of the 5th year of study, he got a 2-year internship with NASA at JPL. He continued on as an employee for the next 7 years.

A friend of a friend was already living in LV and absolutely loving the life, so on the basis of that glowing recommendation, he moved here in 2009. Through the ongoing monthly meetings of the LV Research and Advisory Committee (RAC), an important topic was identified on behalf of LV residents: Finding answers and solutions to the numerous issues surrounding Energy, including solar, electric vehicles, in-home savings on electrical use, and more. A sub-group was formed to research the topic, and as a result, they recommended the Board sponsor a well-organized, informative Town Hall on the subject.

It was unanimously approved by the Board and the Town Hall on energy options was set for January 17th in the AR. The event drew well over a hundred residents!

The program was moderated by group member Larry Swartz. It featured each of the group members Bob Bueling, John Dowsing, Steven Gelfand and Wayne King, delivering informative presentations on key home energy topics. A special guest, Doug Chiapuzio

COMMUNITY NEWS

Camrosa Water Lines Inventory - A Camrosa contractor will be visiting LV to take an inventory of individual service lines and valves for each unit to comply with EPA requirements. According to this regulatory requirement, Camrosa must develop an inventory to identify the materials of service lines connected to the public water distribution system. The service line materials inventory must be publicly accessible and must include a location identifier, such as a street address. If you see someone in your front yard looking at your water connection, this is what is going on. Village 28 Storm Sewers - The Board approved a project to clean out the sewer line in Village 28. In addition, there is a gate at the end of the line where it empties into Conejo Creek. Material around the gate must be removed and the gate repaired. If you see a crane along the back of the Village along Conejo Creek, the repair of the gate is underway. This will help prevent backflow into our drainage system

during large rain events.

Paint Project – The paint project is moving on to Villages 7, 9 and 19 which are the next phase of the paint project.

Water Usage – The usage of household water in the Village has been slowly increasing. We started at 64+ gallons of water per person per day (GPD). During the drought when restrictions were in place, we dropped to 54 GPD. We know that restrictions have been lifted, but water is paid for by the Village and is included in your HOA fees. The cost of this increase in water usage is coming right out of our pockets.

Regarding water usage, the new budget contains a 10% planned reduction in non-potable (irrigation) water usage. This is being done by changing the irrigation system times and durations. This is a \$80,000 decrease in budgeted water cost which went straight to reducing next year's HOA fees.

Roofing – Work has begun on the next phase of the roofing project. Work is underway in Village 5.

Concrete - At the December meeting, the Board decided to authorize the repair of the category 3 and 2 concrete problems. Finalization of the contract with the contractor is in process. We should see the start of the concrete work in February. Garage Doors - The Board reviewed the garage door policy and, with the input from several Villagers, sent the policy back to staff and the Attorney for more clarification. The current rule is deemed too vague, and it needs to be clarified. A garage door policy is needed to address "problem" situations and is not intended to limit normal activities where garage access is required. The policy wording needs to reflect this. Green Waste Containers - Residents are dropping off garbage into the Green Waste Containers at the back of the East Rec. Center Parking Lot. These containers are intended for compostable green waste only. Cameras have been installed to view the green waste bin area. People dropping off garbage (not green waste) will be identified and fines can be imposed to resolve this problem.

Administration Building Sewers -

The Admin building is experiencing serious problems with its sewers which will require major repair. The Board approved the repair contract for the sewer and restoration of the women's and men's bathrooms in the Admin Building.

Revised Fee Schedule - A new fee schedule was approved by the board. In general fees were reduced (when is the last time something like that happened?) A new fee for solar panel installation was added. A one-time fee is to be charged for all new RV access permits. It includes a non-refundable access key. Frontsteps – Frontsteps is the new software system to be used to automate many functions of the Village administration. It is a database based system where office functions and resident access to information will be provided. Over time it will provide resident financial information, a continuously updated resident directory, on-line green sheet (and other forms) submission with tracking, integration of Frontsteps with the current website, license plate readers to support Village gate access and many other fea-



Dementia simulation, virtual reality classes to be offered

Camarillo Health Care District will offer classes exclusively for Leisure Village residents February through June in the Recreation Center.

Dementia Live, a high-impact dementia simulation experience developed by AGE-ucate Training Institute, will be held in 45-minute intervals at 9, 10 & 11 am on Feb. 16.

Dementia Live engages participants into what it's like to live with dementia, resulting in a deeper understanding of what it's like to live with cognitive impairment and sensory change. Class participants put on items that simulate the loss of different functions, giving them an immersive experience that elevates quality of care, compassion and empathy as well as a deeper understanding of the challenges that one faces when living with dementia.


After the experience, there is a small-group post-discussion about what the experience felt like, how the caregiver must be the change agent as the person with dementia cannot change, and what can be done to improve communication and care processes, empowering caregivers with practical tools and techniques that will ultimately make them better caregivers.

Adventures in Virtual Reality will

be offered 10-11:30 am and 1-2:30 pm on Feb. 14. In the morning class, you'll learn how to use the virtual reality equipment and then dive into the ocean virtually using the application "Ocean Rift." You'll choose a number of sea creatures to swim with during your underwater adventure including dolphins, whales, sea lions, sea turtles and manatees. In the afternoon class, you'll also learn the equipment before trying out the application "Nature Treks." Choose a natural setting with animals — a safari with zebra, giraffes and elephants or a meadow with rabbits and deer, and then change your surroundings by releasing butterflies, changing it from night to day, making it rain, or growing trees and flowers that will crop up around you. Relax in nature as you listen to birds singing in this tranquil environment.

Additional introductory VR classes will be offered on March 26, May 15 and June 10, at the same time of day for each application.

Healthy Benefits From Our Furry Friends

Being an animal lover my entire life, I knew there were many benefits to having a cat or a dog or both. Growing up with cats and dogs (as well as other animals, fish and birds), I have an appreciation for their differences, how intuitive and smart they are and how they display loyalty to us. Cats and dogs display their loyalty to us differently. When I moved here in the fall of 2020 with my two small white dogs (one passed in 2022), I didn't realize how many Villagers had small white dogs - they are everywhere. In general, most small white dogs are non-shedding, easy to take care of in our downsized homes here in the Village and have smaller poop to manage. 

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HISTORIC REFLECTION

Historic Lumber Yard to Become Low Income Housing

Have you noticed new construction at the corner of Lewis Road and Barry Street? Habitat for Humanity is building low income housing there now where Stock Lumber used to be. Here is the history of our first lumber yard.

In 1890, local farmers and ranchers started a cooperative so they could have lumber and building ma-

terials at a fair price. It was incorporated as Peoples Lumber Company. The enterprise had a broad basis of support in the county. In 1926, 9000 shares of stock had been issued, with the largest holding only 400 shares. The business was initially financed with \$20,000 and was valued at \$900,000 in 1950 when it had 150 employees. Adolfo Camarillo was on

the Board of Directors for over 20 years and was President of the Board from 1942 to 1950.

It all began when rancher Charles J. Daily complained about the three days it took for a wagon to haul lumber from Santa Barbara to Ventura. He said it was "about time the people of Ventura County have a lumber yard of their own." The new Santa Susana, Moorpark and Camarillo. Local resident Gerry Olsen remembers going to the Camarillo yard in the 1950s. It was the closest lumber yard to Thousand Oaks where his father Nick Olsen was building a house.

Each lumber yard was a "one stop shop" selling the full range of materials needed for farms and construction, including plaster, cement and barbed wire. The company steadily expanded with a cabinet shop, planing mill, a brick and tile factory, and had a fleet of 15 delivery trucks. They invested in land and shares of the Venture Wharf & Warehouse Co. and the Ojai-Ventura Railroad. In 1947, they developed a lumber mill near Crescent City where 1 billion board-feet of timber was available within 30 miles of the mill.

Part of the Camarillo yard was leased to Signal Oil Company in 1960 for a gas station. When the lease expired in 1973, it became Baysinger Mechanics. Sun Lumber Co. bought the lumber business in 1974 for \$533,000, and its parent company, Lone Star, bought the remaining land for \$1,000,000. By 1982, Peoples Lumber Company had changed its focus to become a Real Estate Investment Trust. The Camarillo yard operated as Stock Building Supply until it closed in 2018.

Not Every "Friend" is your Friend on Facebook

I started using Facebook circa 2007 even though Facebook went online in 2004. I've had 9 years to gather a lot of friends on my FB profile. While having a large amount of friends on my page is nice for my ego, I am going to give advice that is the opposite of how I have accepted friends.

From the book "Complete Guide to Internet Privacy, Anonymity and Security," the author Matthew Bailey suggests, "Accept friend requests from people you actually know." I agree.

When you accept friend requests from people you don't know, you may be running a security risk.

If someone sends me a friend request, I go on their profile immediately and see if we have mutual friends. Because of my background in the ministry, I know a lot of people who know a lot more people. I have written a few small booklets, published hundreds of blogs and have become known in a small community of like minded people. Consequently, I receive frequent requests. I assume people just want to read my Facebook posts.

However, I still have to check people out. It only takes one "friend" with poor privacy settings to result in my information being shared more than I ever expected. Bailey adds, "Many of your friends may be unaware that, depending on their privacy settings, they may be granting access to their friend's data (including your data). This can happen regardless of your own settings.

While some of us may be patting ourselves on our back for having so many friends, please don't forget all it takes is one "weak link" in the privacy settings chain of one of your friends to compromise your security. I offer a word of caution that some people may be friending you to gain entrance to your more detailed information you post on Facebook. This is why I warned you not to post certain items (which I will discuss more). A cyber-troll can disguise themselves as an innocent "friend" to determine where you live or your whereabouts.

Think about what you post on Facebook. Do you post controversial posts like I do? Someone with less than honorable motives can obtain access to these posts or your photos for the purpose of using them in some way to harm you. I have warned teenagers about certain photos they put up on social media sites that could hurt them in the future or

present an image of themselves they might not want others to see.

I will have more to say on accepting "friend" requests on Facebook. This is a subject that demands much discussion and wisdom regarding information that Should Not Be Shared on Facebook.

Using Facebook is often an enjoy-

able experience: the virtual connection with friends and family, making new "friends", viewing photos, reading interesting posts, watching Facebook Live videos and even starting a business page. Because Facebook is so enjoyable it is easy to let your guard down with all the information you make accessible to others.

Here is a list of all the types of information that should not be shared on Facebook:

Your full date of birth, your full name (including your middle name), your maiden name, your phone number, your photo, your vacation plans in advance of your trip.

Keep in mind that any personal information that would help someone pretend they are you including personal information about friends and family can put you at risk to expose this info to sources with nefarious intentions.

The information about you referred to above is more commonly known as "sensitive unclassified material." If you give away too much information about yourself, you have made it easy for identity thieves to gain a lot of information about you and are willing to exploit that information in ways that benefit them and could harm you.

An upcoming subject of this column will share how identity thieves can use all this information in ways you may have never guessed.
