LV resident, at age 101, is a real pioneer




Bob Browne is a gentleman. In his thoughts, he maintains his own database of kind, considerate, helpful and loving thoughts that he is willing to share with others.

Players Guild awards show set for Aug. 21



LETTERS

(Editor's note: The subject of ramps was brought up in a letter from Ben Perry in the July issue of ILV. As it is our policy not to take sides on issues that require Board of Director actions, we believe that Ted Lansing's letter, printed below, seeks only to explain the legal limits imposed by building codes, as well as that of our CC&Rs that the Board must consider when addressing this matter.)

Recently, through homeowner correspondence and an article in Inside Leisure Village, the issue of residential ramps for handicapped residents has been raised.

This issue has created a mistaken perception among some residents that the Board of Directors is insensitive to the needs and concerns of those who have difficulty using walkers, wheelchairs or electric scooters to get in and out of their homes.

The subject of handicap access has been discussed and agonized over for years.

Any discussion in the Village demands a proper perspective and the correction of some apparent misconceptions:

(1) Leisure Village is not a public entity, it is totally private;

(2) Therefore, the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, ADA, do not apply here;

(3) Right or wrong, the Village was not conceived or designed to accommodate the handicapped;

(4) Most residences were not constructed to allow for ramps at the main entrances;

(5) The Village must conform to certain building codes;

(6) Ramps require flat areas called landings — if space inside the residence, the footprint, is not adequate to meet the code requirements, a ramp may not be built;

(7) Authorization by the Board to build an illegal ramp would expose the Association to serious liability problems;

(8) The resident's own liability insurance would probably not honor any claim resulting from an illegal item (ramp) on the property.

Allowing minor encroachments into the common area to make room for a ramp might seem to be a simple expedient, it is not. Such an encroachment would represent a commitment of that part of the common area to "exclusive use," in essence, in law, designating it as private ownership. Our CC&Rs specifically prohibit the Association from making such a change in the common area without putting it to a vote of the entire membership, requiring 75 percent approval [Sec. VII, 7.2(b) (2) & 7.4(c)]

However, despite all of this, there is a possible relief to the situation under active investigation at the present time. The outcome is uncertain, but it may allow some relief for some, if not all, the homes that cannot now

legally accommodate an entry ramp.

But beware: Any ramp installation must conform to all applicable building regulations.

Stay tuned.

Breathe better, enjoy life more



register whether the car is owned by an up-to-date, dues-paying owner or renter. The east and west gate can then operate without a guard at all. A camera strategically placed will display both entrances on a monitor in the main gate.

There would be a guard for a short period in the morning and again at night at the west gate to let in the maintenance crew. In case of illegal entry, we have our regular security, which can be there in an instant.

Having lived in a gated community here in Cali-

fornia for 12 years with the bar code system, I observed firsthand there were very few problems. In case of a construction truck accidentally breaking the gate arm, it gets recorded and instant action can be taken. Also, a sign by both entrances will warn of substantial fines that would be levied against all perpetrators.

This system, once installed, would be a source of great satisfaction for all members. It would really bring Leisure Village up to date with a much smoother ingress and egress system and save a bundle in the process.



The November 20 class will be the last offered in 2008, and as of early July, there was still room available. The class will be given in the MPR from 1 to 5:30 p.m.

This is a 4 1/2-hour accelerated class offered by AARP for the benefit of licensed drivers in Leisure Village who want to continue safe driving and be brought up to date on current California DMV rules and regulation. California law requires that insurance companies give a discount to everyone who takes this class, and the

discount is good for three years. If you are 70 years or older and need to renew your drivers license, you will be required to pass a written test. This class will be helpful to prepare you.

Only those who have previously completed the two-day, eight-hour class may take this class. If you need to take the two-day class or a class during the months we do not offer it here in LV, call Claudia Roberts, who has information on other locations and dates, at 482-9904.

The cost is \$10 per person with a check made payable to AARP. Pre-registration and pre-payment are required.




We are happy to welcome back Dr. Carolyn Dorrance of Oxnard Community College who will teach a philosophy class on "Ethics."

Realtors Corner: Is your insurance right for you?

Insurance policies and coverages can be confusing!

Our Leisure Village Association has a master insurance policy that covers the perimeter and structural walls only on each home. It is sometimes referred to as a "bare bones policy."

If a homeowner has a fire in their unit and has to make a claim, there is a \$5,000 deductible assessed to the homeowner. You should have a personal insurance policy (HO6), which may include coverage that pays the \$5,000 deductible on the master policy. This coverage would be found under Loss Assessment. Make sure you have coverage for at least these limits.

Not covered in the master policy are cabinets, sinks, toilets, vanities, stove, dishwasher, refrigerator, washer,

dryer, garbage disposal, water heater, flooring, lighting, etc. Personal property contents of one's home are not covered at all on the master policy but would be included on your HO6 policy. There are sub-limits for jewelry and other target items, so you may want to add a floater to insure those specific items. It is very important to include Contents Replacement Cost to your policy so your insurance will pay you "new for old" on your contents should you have a loss.

For some earthquake coverage, add Earthquake Loss Assessment at \$50,000 to your California Earthquake Authority Policy.

Please be sure you have the correct coverage. Once a loss occurs, it's too late!

Bits from the Board: July 7 business

From the Open Board Meeting of July 7:

— A discussion of the Administration Office being kept open between noon and 1 p.m. The Board approved Mary Hurt's suggestion of a trial period of three months.

— Use of potable water for washing vehicles, including RVs, and washing down driveways may be prohibited. The Village is past Level 1 water and is now in Level 2,

which is 50 percent more expensive. On motion, the matter will be referred to staff to be looked at from a legal standpoint.

— The Purchase Research Committee will be re-established, with volunteers requested to serve on the committee.

— The Board accepted the Architectural Committee's recommendation to withdraw their request to require changing wood garage doors to aluminum upon sale of the residence.

— The Board approved the placement of donation cans in the Administration Office and the Rec Center by the Planned Giving Committee to collect quarters (and other coins and legal tender) to fund replanting the area in front of the Rec Center.

— Jane Needle's resignation as chairperson of the Building & Grounds Committee was accepted with regret.



Bathrooms, earthquakes don't mix

What would you do if you were taking a bath or shower when the great earthquake struck?

Bathtubs and showers are dangerous environments even when the earth isn't shaking. Be alert to avoid serious injury.

If you are standing, sit down quickly when you feel the first vibrations.

If you are sitting, brace yourself until the shaking stops.

Postpone any evacuation plans until you are confident that you can get out of the tub or shower without injury. Most people don't keep a flashlight in the bathroom for emergency purposes. Broken mirrors or other objects could be extremely hazardous in a darkened

bathroom. One or two lightsticks taped under a counter or some other convenient spot would be welcome if the bathroom lights fail. Lightsticks can be purchased at any store that sells camping equipment and supplies.

we all know he would have won it if he was there.

Most of our LVMGA members know about the life of this extraordinary man whom we have the privilege of living with in Leisure Village.

On May 1, while we were playing golf at Buenaventura, President Bush saluted our own Ben Kuroki and paid tribute to the bravery of Nisei veterans of World War II during a celebration for Asian Pacific American Heritage Month.

Six Japanese American Veterans Association World War II veterans were selected by the White House to represent the 360,000 Asian Pacific American veterans and 29,000 active duty personnel for special recognition.

According to the White House Web site, here are the words President Bush used to honor Ben:

"Two days after Pearl Harbor, Ben volunteered to join the Army, where there is no doubt he met prejudice at nearly every turn. Still, he became one of the few 'Nisei' admitted to the Army Air Corps.

He flew 58 missions over Europe and Japan, and he earned three Distinguished Flying Crosses.

"When he came back home, he turned to another mission: working to overcome the intolerance he had experienced during his early days in the Army. Ben edited newspapers. He spoke to audiences around the country. He became a strong advocate of racial equality. He knew something — and he knew the subject well, unfortunately.

"Sixty years after the Japanese surrender, Ben received the U.S. Army Distinguished Service Medal. And at the ceremony, here's what he said: 'I had to fight like hell to fight for my country — and now I feel completely vindicated.'

"We are glad you feel vindicated, but I am proud to tell you, America is a better place because of you, Ben. Thank you for coming."

Ben was the only Japanese-American who flew in air combat missions in the Asia Pacific Theater.

Ben was further honored that evening at a tribute before a packed

"The Most Honorable Son," a 45-minute movie about Leisure Village resident Ben Kuroki, will be shown on September 3 at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Channels 25 and 831. It has been updated to include the latest awards bestowed on Kuroki by the White House and the Smithsonian Institute.

audience at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum. The event featured a screening of the documentary of his life, "The Most Honorable Son," at the Lockheed Martin IMAX Theater. Museum Director Gen. John R. Dailey, U.S. Marine Corps (ret.), cited Kuroki's courage and perseverance to remain in the Corps, which was rife with discrimination and prejudice against Japanese-Americans.






Bill, who moved from Camarillo to Arizona. The family includes nine grandchildren, four boys and five girls.
